Preparations for the Sixteenth National Irrigation Congress to be held at Albuquerque, N. M. are progressing very satisfactorily. Col. Hopewell, chairman, and Col. Twitchell, secretary of the Board of Control, aided by a corps of efficient clerks are engaged day and night in sending out all sorts of advertising literature to the various executive committeemen and others prominently identified with irrigation matters in the seventeen states and territories under the Reclamation Act.

Harry Thaw will have to spend some time in an insane asylum. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty on account of insanity and committed the prisoner to Mattewan. This means that Thaw will probably be forced to remain at that institution for some weeks or months, after which he will in probability be removed to a private sanitarium, then discharged as "cured."

Looks like piling it up on poor old Prof. Osler. Henry Gassaway Davis, 84, is getting ready for his wedding, and announcement comes from England that Ambassador Bryce will be retained in the diplomatic service three years beyond the age limit of 70 years. And then there's Speaker Cannon after the presidency.

In answer to an inquiry from Superintendent Ackerman, Attorney-General Crawford made a ruling of sweeping effect in public school management, for he holds that the County Superintendent may remove from office members of boards of directors who do not supply their schools with suitable equipment.

Plans are being laid for the prosecution of Harry Orchard, the confessed murderer of former Governor Frank Steunenberg. The prosecuting attorney insists that Orchard has no immunity contract and that he will have to pay the penalty for his crime. The trial will be commenced in March or April.

The management of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition figures conservatively, from the example set by Portland, that the paid attendance at the 1909 fair will reach 2,500,000, which will make it one of, if not the most successful exposition ever held.

Governor Chamberlain is in receipt of an anonymous letter demanding the pardon of John Branton, under threat that unless the convict is released by February 20, the Governor would meet the fate dealt out to Steunenberg and Brown.

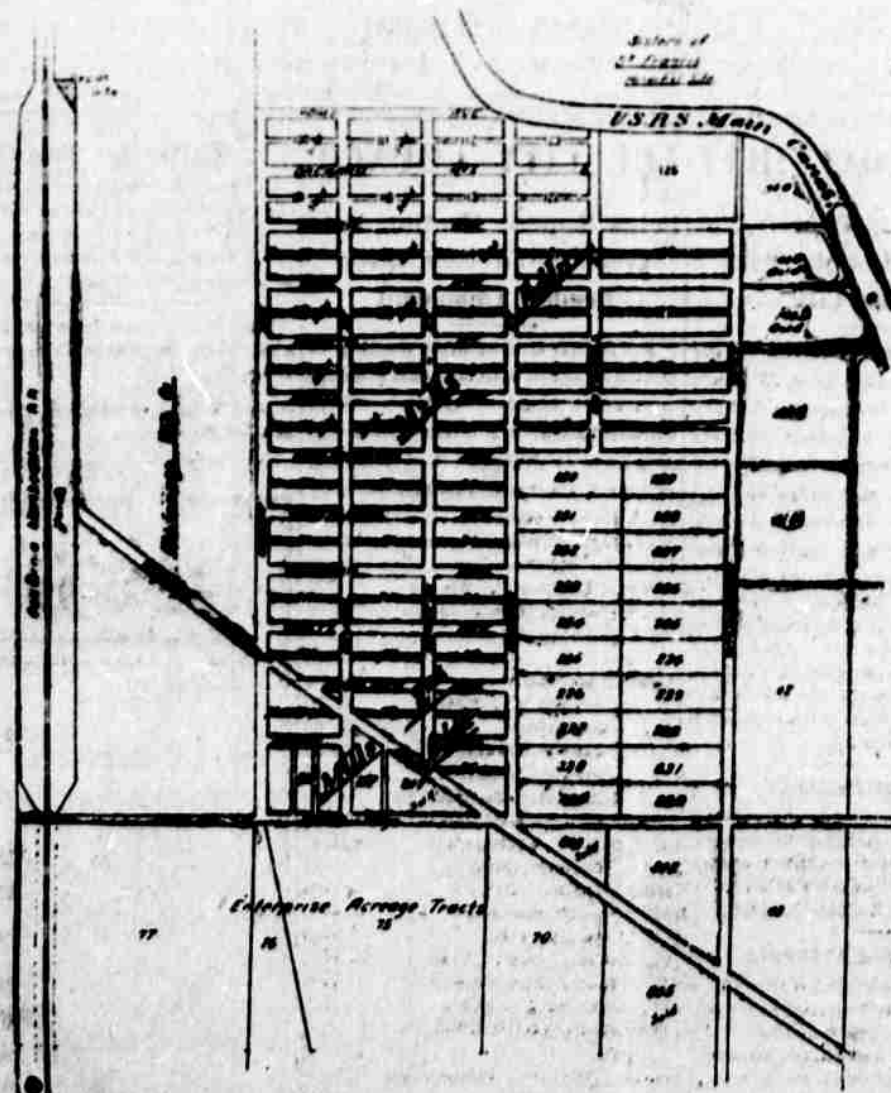
