WASHINGTON LETTER

(Special Correspondence.)
Congress is eliminating the frock coat habit. More than half the members of the new congress have shown their disapproval of the time honored costume by appearing on the floor of the house in the regulation business suit of tweed. Red and lavender neckties can poll a larger vote than the somber black string tie, and old members, loyal to the frock coat and its accessories, are discussing with despair the future of congressional tan shoes.

Passing of the Frock Coat.
These sartorial belligerents declare that the revolt against the unwritten law concerning the frock coat habit is chiefly in the interests of comfort. Whether they would appear to better advantage in solemn black or becoming blue, they insist, is a matter of secondary consideration.

Congress never welcomed a larger number of well tailored members. But their clothes are creased and pressed after the latest Fifth avenue fashion plates in place of the statesmanlike cut.

Fear expressed by members of the house for the doom of the frock coat has already disturbed the equanimity of the senate by the appearance of a couple of belligerents in the ranks of this black coated body.

The Issue Joined.
The battle between tweeds and broadcloth, black and lavender, giddy waistcoats and Henry Clay conservatives, top hats and soft hats, has been aggravated by the general youthfulness of the new members, who, with wardrobes larger than a Newport bride, declare they are prepared to fight the issue to a finish.

Many members object to the regulation dress because of their faith in the new scientific color theories, and men who wear red waistcoats because they have been told by scientists and astrologers that red was their astral color shudder at the thought of putting on the somber black, funeral looking clothes.

Bingham a Reformer.
Among the defiant ones in the house, who has been dubbed leader of the dress insurgents, is Richmond Pearson Hobson. Pale looking and thin, Captain Hobson rigorously shuns the black coat frock. He belongs to the constituency of red neckties, which he wears with a well fitting sack coat suit of granite gray, with gray spots over patent leathers, and almost always wears lavender handkerchiefs.

Even General Henry H. Bingham, known as the "father of the house," has joined the congressional dress reformers and joyfully buried the frock coat suit he wore with pride when first elected to the forty-sixth congress. General Bingham adds to the new color scheme of the house by wearing a jaunty blue cheviot sack coat suit with colored waistcoat and Philadelphia's choicest ties.

Winter at the Capital.
The topographical situation of the capital is such that its winter climate, to be summed up in a line, may be said to be comparatively mild and bracing. Tomatoes can be canned and passe-partout placed over the sealing wax, and they will not need to be taken from the cans. In fact, they could not, for they would spoil. This is a good idea for country parents who wonder how they can send their children different kinds of fruits from home—and is anything more appreciated?

Automobile Fire Patrol.
Boston's fire fighting strength has been increased by the addition of an automobile fire patrol wagon. There is the customary seat for the chauffeur and a seat beside him for one man. In the rear are carried the other men and the fire fighting equipment. In ordinary use the wagon will carry four men, but in an emergency it can carry six or eight. Its equipment includes eighteen covers, axes, ceiling pike, plaster hook, two extinguishers, two five foot extension ladders, sprinkler boxes with sprinkler heads and tools, a Detroit door opener and a life net. All this is stowed away in boxes, the life net being carried in a box under the rear step.
