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NEWSPAPER LAW OF OREGON.—Section 2882 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person controlling a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

Mr. Heney tells of the great law practice he abandoned in order that he might come and prosecute the land fraud cases. He says he was getting from \$40,000 to \$50,000 a year from his practice in San Francisco. If that statement is equal in truth and veracity to the ones to which he subscribed in writing, the \$40,000 to \$50,000 per annum would dwindle down to \$40 or \$50 per month.

In the course of the battleship debate in the House, Representative Hobson said that the President had told him that he would veto any public building bill that might be sent him unless he secured more battleships, that he had heard of a threat by the House that unless the naval programme was cut to two ships the House would refuse to pass any public building bills. Representative Hobson's amendment to the naval appropriation bill providing for four battleships instead of two, as reported by the naval committee, was defeated by the House, 79 to 190.

"Heney is a willful, malicious and deliberate liar." Such, in the concrete, is the sweeping reply which United States Senator Charles W. Fulton made to the charges of corrupt political practices which Francis J. Heney has been making against the Senator. The seating capacity of the Armory is about 4,200, and the attendance was approximately 5000, with many turned away. It was a cheering crowd. First Fulton was cheered and then when a Heney admirer proposed three hips for Heney they were given, and when W. D. Wheelright, chairman of the meeting mentioned George E. Chamberlain's name in connection with his introduction to Fulton, there were cheers for George.

People insure their goods by land and sea. The custom is of long standing. It has not driven capable shipbuilders and navigators out of business, nor retarded the introduction of house construction, nor yet laid a withering blight of paternalism and socialism upon the world. In view of which we hardly understand why a proposal to insure bank deposits should produce such commotion. The guaranty of deposits, as enacted in Oklahoma or as proposed in the Fowler bill, is simply a system of insurance. A very small tax, or premium, levied upon all deposits, something like forty cents on the thousand dollars, we believe, would have covered all losses suffered by national bank depositors through bank failures. Such insurance would not "put good bank management at a discount." Every good banker ought to favor every proposal which would improve the banking business as a whole, which would increase public confidence in banks in general, which would tend to make every man with any money deposit it in some bank instead of hoarding it, which would lessen the probability of panic among depositors in unquiet times.
