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NEWSPAPER LAW OF OREGON—Section 2822 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person controlling a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

It is never too late to begin the good work.

WHO WILL BE MAYOR

Two very good men received the nomination for Mayor at the election yesterday. It is unnecessary to say anything in support of Frank Ward, as most of our readers have known him much longer than we have. He is an old resident of this county and city and has always taken an active interest in the development of the town. He is pledged to the enforcement of the law, the extending of the city limits and the bonding of the city for the payment of its debts. Mr. John Stilts has been a resident of the city for nearly five years and is at present a very active member of the council. It is evident that many people have gotten the idea that the city election is going to be a local option fight. These people should dis-abuse their minds of this opinion at once. Local option will be decided at the election in June, but it or any other fight should not be allowed to enter our city election. The financial question is the one important matter to be considered in the conduct of the city's affairs. If our city is to continue to prosper, it must be placed on a sound financial basis. There are many improvements which must be made and every month's delay in starting is just to that extent working harm to the town and endangering the property and business interests of every person who expects to make this their home. The question to be decided at the election is, not whether one man is a saloon man or a Civic Federation man, but which one is the best financier and the most capable of successfully placing the city on its feet again.


