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NEWSPAPER LAW OF OREGON.—Section 2882 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person controlling a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

The Thunderer.
