**THE "ANTI"**

The "Anti" published in the interest of the saloon, has made its appearance and on account of the personal nature of the articles, has caused a considerable amount of bitterness and hard feeling among its readers. The sheet is being generously distributed and will probably be read throughout every portion of the county.

While the Herald does not agree with the Local Option people that prohibition is the solution of the liquor question, we can hardly condone the method of fighting which has been adopted by the saloon men. We cannot believe that the bitter personal attacks will result in changing one vote on the question, especially in favor of the parties making the attack. When an individual is condemned in such language that is used in the "Anti" it usually results in forcing his friends to come to his support whether they believe in his fight or not.

**CHANGE TIME OF ELECTION**

One of the measures to be submitted to the voters at the election next Monday which should receive their careful attention, is the amendment to the constitution of the state changing the time of holding the regular biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. This measure should receive the support of every voter in the state. Take the present year. We no more get through with one election than we are starting in on another. With our nominating and general elections for municipal, county, state and national offices, strung out through the entire year, it is impossible for all the people to find time to go to the polls and exercise their rights at every election. If the county, state and national elections should be held in November, it would be of enough importance to bring all the voters out and would result in a great saving to the state and counties.

the newspapers of the country of giving the news of the Republican national convention this year will be \$250,000. Although the convention is still three weeks off, the preparations for it have been put actively under way with the opening of headquarters last week by Secretary Dover of the national committee and the letting of contracts for red, white and blue bunting. From the reports that have been received and the record of reservations at the hotels it will be the largest political gathering ever held in this country. It is likely also to be the most fully reported if the demand for press accommodations is any indication. The news associations have announced that they will need more space than ever before, and the papers which ordinarily send only one representative are asking for places for three or four.

The governors who made the greatest impression as strong men at the recent conference of governors were Hughes of New York, Fort of New Jersey, Folk of Missouri, Johnson of Minnesota, Swanson of Virginia and Deneen of Illinois. Other men made a good impression, but these half dozen would probably be picked out as coming men in the future politics of the country. Three of the men—Hughes, Johnson and Folk—have been considered as presidential possibilities for this year. These three, together with Deneen, Swanson and Fort, are considered possibilities sometime in the future.

Every land owner should vote "no" on the amendment to the Tax law. The measure is numbered 322 and 323 on the official ballot. The amendment provides for the exemption from taxation of all buildings and improvements, all machinery used for manufacturing purposes, all tools, live stock, fruit trees, vines etc. In fact it is a step in the direction of the Single tax and to remove taxation from industry and place it on land values. You do not want the farmers and the landowners to pay all the taxes.

Three American warship fleets will cruise in foreign waters during eight or ten weeks next fall. When the Atlantic fleet of seventeen battleships is ready to depart from Australia for Japan and China, the armored cruisers squadron of the Pacific fleet will begin a cruise to Samoa and the

South Sea and in all probability a new squadron, to be formed on the Atlantic coast this summer, will sail to England and the Mediterranean.

Do not forget to vote for the appropriation for the state University when you go to the polls on Monday next. If you have nothing else to give your children, give them the advantage of getting an education, which will fit them to hold their own in fighting life's battles.

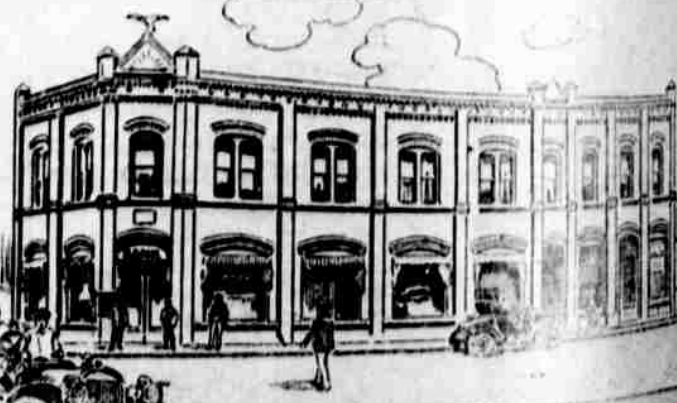

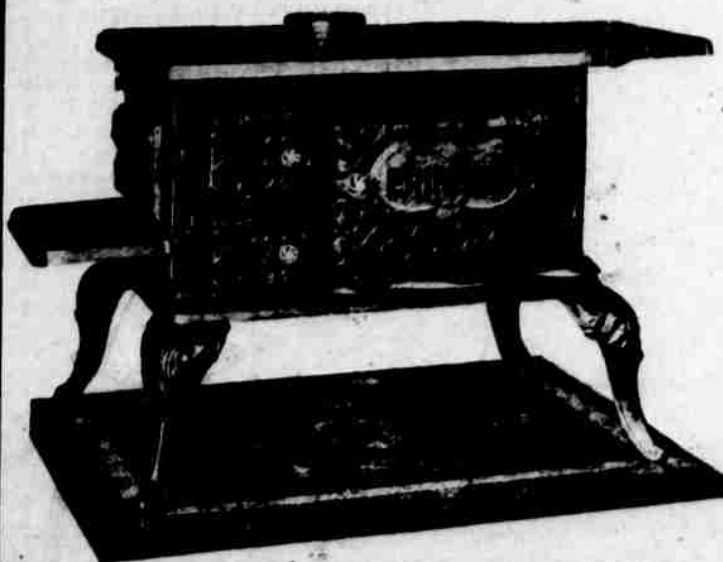
