DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, GENERAL LAND OFFICE, Washington, D. C., May 2, 1908. Notice of restoration of public lands to private ownership and entry. Notice is hereby given that the Secretary of the Interior has, pursuant to the act of March 3, 1907, approved March 10, 1907, and the act of June 17, 1908, approved June 17, 1908, and in connection with the Klamath Project, Oregon, of the following described lands in the State of Oregon, and by his authority such of said lands as have not been heretofore finally restored and are not otherwise withdrawn, reserved or appropriated, will be subject to settlement under the public land laws of the United States on and after July 20, 1908, but shall not be subject to entry, filing or selection until August 20, 1908, at the United States Land Office at Lakeview, Oregon, warning being expressly given that no person will be permitted to gain or secure any right whatever under any settlement or occupation begun after May 1, 1908, and prior to July 20, 1908, of settlement or occupation being forbidden. 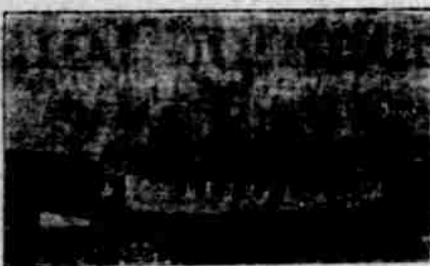
