

CHAMBERLAIN AND PROHIBITION

COUNTRY VOTES DRY RETURNS OF KLAMATH COUNTY

Klamath Falls Goes Wet But Not Enough to Carry the County

Snow precinct, which is one of the smallest in the county, is the only one that has been heard from that has not gone dry. Odell has not been heard from, but the prediction of those that know is that it will also line up in the dry column. In many of the places the majority against the saloons was very small, but in every instance it showed that there is a strong sentiment against the liquor traffic and that it is the wish of the majority of the voters throughout the county that saloons be done away with. The prohibition will go into effect at the same time that the newly elected county officers assume their duties, the first Monday in July. According to the local option law every precinct that voted dry will be dry regardless of the general result of the entire county. Should Klamath Falls cast enough votes against prohibition to make the vote of the county wet, then it will be the only place in the county that will have saloons, but should the majority in this precinct not be large enough to place the county in the wet column then this county must also go dry.

concede that it is impossible for the county to go wet on the strength of the vote in the Linkville precinct. Just before going to press the indications are that the county will go dry by about 75 votes. The majority in the outside precincts is 135 and it is estimated that this precinct will be wet by more than 60 votes.

Kuykendall Elected

The Klamath Falls Transportation Company closed its office at Pokegama on June 1st and this company is now transacting all of its business via Dorris. The men who have been stationed at Pokegama have been transferred either to this city or to points between here and Dorris. Since the transfer of the mail to the new route there is no longer a regular service by way of Pokegama.

First "Dry" Sale

This morning when the report became current that the county had gone dry a Klamath Falls business man stated that he would sell his place for 50 cents on the dollar. One of his employers accepted the offer and paid ten dollars to bind the bargain. The deal has not yet been made public, but if the final vote should put the county in the dry column the purchaser will insist on having the business at just one half of what it will invoice.

E. L. Swartzlander, while in the city from the Klamath Agency, stated that the tennis club of that place was putting in full time practicing and that they were coming to the tournament in this city to win. They have a splendid court and much interest is being taken in the game.
