PREPARING INFORMATION

The United States Reclamation Service is preparing a series of illustrated circulars giving full information regarding the several large irrigation projects already completed or under construction. These circulars will be invaluable to anyone thinking of taking up irrigation lands on any of the government projects. Specific information will be separately prepared for every project. At the same time a general circular will be prepared for persons who desire general information and do not know where they wish to settle. The general circular will not go quite as much into detail as those which deal with single projects.

The reclamation service daily receives great quantities of letters asking information regarding its work throughout the great west. The rule heretofore has been to send out a batch of information to all inquirers—about all the printed matter ever issued by the service. To persons who were especially interested in a specific project, this method was not altogether satisfactory, since it gave them a great deal of information that was of no immediate value and failed to go enough into detail regarding the particular locations about which inquiries were made.

Instead of referring inquiries to engineers in the field, officials are now asking all interested persons to write directly to headquarters. A good deal of data has already been prepared and the manuscripts descriptive of some projects are completed. It will be some time, however, before the pictures are ready and the work is sent to the printer. The illustrated circulars will be issued just as soon as possible, every effort being made to expedite the work.

It is not necessary to wait until official announcement is made that these circulars are ready for distribution. It is safe to say that they will not be ready for several weeks. Meanwhile anyone interested can send in their names and have their requests filed. When the new descriptive

matter is ready their requests for copies will be complied with. In addition to preparing these descriptive circulars, the reclamation service also is making preparations to tell prospective settlers who desire to engage in specific lines of farming where they can do so to best advantage. Where the questions cannot be answered satisfactorily by printed circulars the practice has been and will continue to be to prepare personal letters in addition.

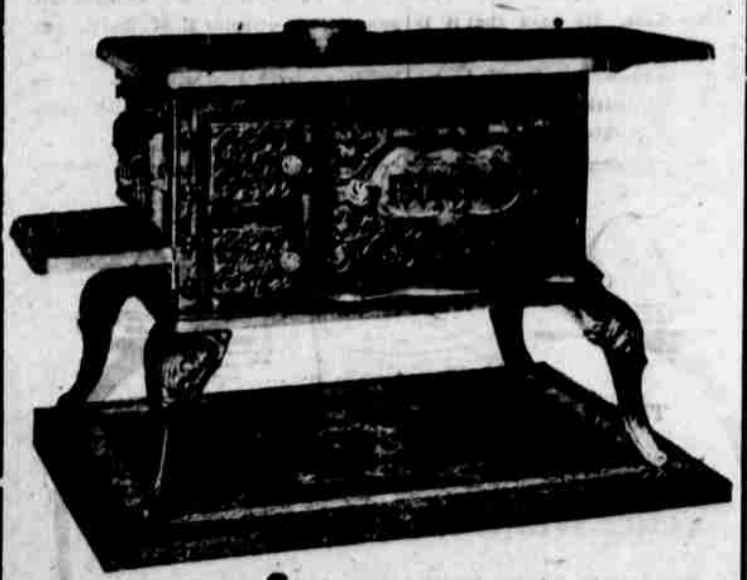
