Lucy Robinson, ten years old, carried off championship honors in the inter-county spelling contest at Manchester, Ia. Teams of ten each represented Black Hawk and Delaware counties, Delaware winning both team and individual honors. Lucy Robinson is a three times champion, having won her first medal when seven years old.

### The Royal Box.

Prince Henry, brother of the German kaiser, has joined the Berlin ship club.

Princess Mary of Wales, aged ten, is a depositor in the postoffice savings bank and is said to be giving the promise of much acumen and ability in the management of her independent estate.

Carmen Sylva, the queen of Rumania, rattles off her novels, poems and essays on the typewriter. The click of her machine is heard in the palace from six to seven hours every day and often at night.

### Church and Clergy.

Ground was broken Easter for the new Montview Boulevard Presbyterian church of Denver. Church and Sunday school will each seat 500.

Believing in muscular Christianity, Rev. Norman S. Wolke is captain of a baseball club made up of members of his congregation at Shrewsbury, Pa.

Statistics for 1907 of the Connecticut Congregationalists show that they have one or more churches in each town and city in the state except two.

Rev. William S. Friedman was elected rabbi for life of Temple Emmanuel, in Denver, at the recent annual meeting of the congregation. This is an honor seldom bestowed upon Jewish rabbis. Rev. Mr. Friedman has already served this congregation as rabbi eighteen years.

### Train and Track.

There are ten railways in Nova Scotia, counting the Intercolonial, a government built and operated road, which has 485 miles in the province. The other nine roads have a mileage of only 844 miles.

The Nantucket Central railroad has adopted motor cars in place of the steam locomotives hitherto in use. The motor cars will run on the same tracks under their own power. The road is eight miles long.

The British railways get their supplies of railway ties from Russia, but the Russian forests are now so much exhausted that the peasants have to sledge the trees for making these ties a distance of twenty miles.

London increases in value at the rate of \$90,000,000 a year.
