DAMES AND DAUGHTERS.

Ethel Roosevelt shares her mother's fondness for music and art, and Mrs. Roosevelt and her daughter are the best of comrades.

The Frankfurter Zeitung, one of the most carefully edited papers in Germany, classes Mrs. Nicholas Longworth with the "royalties who type-write their own letters."

Mrs. Grace Leattie has recently contributed \$200,000 to the St. Louis society that is waging war on tuberculosis. She is said to be the richest woman in Missouri.

Miss Leonora O'Reilly, organizer of the Women's Trades Union league, estimates that there are between five and six million working women in the United States. Her work has taken her into every state in the Union and into most large cities.

The celebration of Miss Dinah Jacobs' seventieth birthday occurred recently at her home in Dudley, Mass., in the form of a post card shower. One hundred and forty-one birthday and souvenir cards were received, besides many booklets and motto cards.

Mme. Paquin, the widow of the late famous ladies' tailor, will herself carry on her husband's business in future. Mme. Paquin made her first public speech when she addressed the annual meeting of the shareholders of Paquin, Limited, in London recently.

The Kaiser lately sent Miss Florence Nightingale, through the medium of the German ambassador, a beautiful bouquet of flowers. The gift was accompanied by a letter expressing his majesty's esteem and appreciation of her great services to nursing.

The foundations of the famous cathedral at Strassburg are sinking somewhat, causing a crack in one of the 160 foot pillars supporting the tower.

Between 1888 and 1903 nearly 500 congregational Sunday schools were established in forty seven states and territories, out of which have grown 1,379 churches.

The Indiana bureau of statistics shows that during 1907 persons joined the churches of the state at the rate of nearly 194 a day, the church membership having increased 70,400 during the year.

Rev. John H. Sileman, one of the ablest and most eloquent preachers of the Methodist church, has resigned the presidency of Willamette university of Salem, Ore., and returned again to the Troy (N. Y.) conference.

College and School.

A decree has been published in all the schools of China warning students not to take an interest in politics, contribute to newspapers or read novels.

Bowdoin college, at Brunswick, Me., has just severed the last bond that allied it with any religious organization, and for the first time in fifty years it has no connection with any denomination through the use of its money.

When Harvard, our oldest university, was only an idea in the minds of a few English colonists, the University of San Marcos, in Peru, which is still flourishing, was a well established institution already older than Cornell is today.

Train and Track.

On the early railways in England a lighted candle at night in a station house window meant "stop." Its absence was a signal to go on.

The railways of Nova Scotia, other than the Dominion and Atlantic and the Halifax Southwestern, both having a mileage of 369 miles, are primarily coal roads, and passengers and freight are only incidentals.

Twenty new locomotives have been ordered for the French railway lines in Algiers, and it is believed that more will be needed before the end of the year. From regions supposed to be parts of the desert these railways hauled last year 60,000 tons of grain.

Household Hints.

If feather pillows have an unpleasant odor, give them a thorough drying before a clear fire.

Oil vessels should be kept tightly corked, as kerosene exposed to the air will not burn brightly and will form a crust on the wick shortly after being lighted.

Never place a good piece of furniture very near a fireplace or register. The heat dries the wood and glue, often causing rot where the parts are joined together.

When thin tumbler sticks together and there is danger of breaking them do not try to pull them apart, but put them into a pan of warm suds. In a short time they can be easily separated.

Be careful when you light a fire in the kitchen that there is plenty of water in the boiler. Otherwise when the cold water rushes in the hot boiler it is likely to crack it.
