### IS THE CITY TOO SMALL?

Did anyone hear of any of these outside additions clamoring to get into the city limits? Why, then, is there all this agitation of increasing the boundaries of the city? Haven't the city officials trouble enough on their hands now looking after our 740 acres of streets and lots without burdening them with two thousand three hundred acres more?

Klamath Falls has been accused of trying to run the entire county and it looks as if there might be some justification in the charge and that it wanted to bring the whole county into the incorporation so that it could better accomplish this purpose. Of all foolish propositions this one is certainly the most absurd. Is it possible that this city hasn't enough burdens and troubles to solve without going out into the country and adding several thousands of acres of pasture lands as a further burden on the business men and property owners within the business and resident districts, or do those advocating this extension think that the owners of the land outside of the present boundaries will come in and help us pay off our debts without asking anything in return?

It might be well for those who are seriously agitating this matter to stop and consider what it is probably going to cost and then show us where the city is to be benefited financially or otherwise. It is several miles around the proposed boundaries and sooner or later a permanent survey would have to be made. This alone would take a crew of surveyors six weeks or two months and would mean a probable cost of several thousand dollars. The election under the Initiative law would be another big expense, and then the chances are that it would not carry. Even if it did, the outside property owners are not going to submit to having their property saddled with the present indebtedness of the city. This will mean a law suit and that would cost money. Our over issue of warrants would be protested and the city's financial condition would be in worse shape than ever.

These are only a few of the results of trying to force the outside property to come in, but we believe them to be sufficient for the man who has the city's interest at heart. We believe the city has territory enough now to keep the ordinary council busy, and if they will continue their order of retrenchment and arrange for a bond issue to cover the indebtedness, it won't take many years to put the city on a sound financial basis. The wise business man usually tries to get out of debt first before he attempts to increase his stock, and it should be the same with a city.

### LABOR MAY FIGHT REPUBLICANS

"The time is ripe, the hour has come, the work is imminent and must be done now." Such is the message that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is sending to the organized millions of laborers through the American Federationist. It is designed as the advance signal for war on republican congressmen who refused to give labor its demands during the recent session of Congress. Gompers hints that the fight may be extended to the Presidential contest, but he is waiting for the outcome of the Denver convention before taking a definite position in regard to that campaign.


