OFFICIAL RAINMAKER.

Sherman county, Oregon, where for two seasons Charles M. Hatfield of California, has been coaxing rain from the clouds, is to levy a tax against the property owners next year to pay Mr. Hatfield a regular salary for his services several months during the spring of the year.

Mr. Hatfield was in Portland this week accompanied by his brother, Paul A. Hatfield, his assistant. The two are on their way to Southern California where they will again put into action the chemical process which has worked so successfully.

This has been Mr. Hatfield's second spring in Sherman county. Last year a bumper wheat crop was raised. This year the crop is excellent although the season was very dry. The normal rainfall in 33 years on an average has been one inch from May 1 to July 10. From May 1 to July 10 is the time that Mr. Hatfield's contract calls for his presence in Sherman county to bring about the best results possible in the rain coaxing business. During the time he was at work the rainfall has been 65 per cent more than the normal average in Sherman county during the other years before the Hatfield process was started.

Little is known of the remarkable but successful experiments the Californian has been carrying on in Eastern Oregon. His fame has been spread broadcast and he is always receiving requests and letters asking for more details about his secret and the price he charges for inducing rain from the clouds to fall where it is most desired.

Heretofore the farmers of Sherman county, that is a certain percentage of them, have paid Mr. Hatfield his salary out of their own pockets. Hereafter, however, the county officials will pay him, securing the money by adding a small amount to the tax lists of all the county property.

"I do not claim to be able to make rain," Mr. Hatfield said, "my object being to attract rain from moisture laden clouds that otherwise would pass over the locality in which I am situated. I first thought of the idea when a boy in the arid parts of southern California when cloud after cloud passed over us without ever shedding a drop of water although we needed it badly.

"The system consists of chemical combinations. Nature furnishes the

ground and man fertilizes it to get an increased production. Similarly, nature furnishes moisture bearing clouds and in the same manner assistance is necessary to bring about a greater precipitation.

"My scheme is a natural one—I have simply worked it out on the same principles as is followed by nature in localities where there is always plenty of rain. I give to the atmosphere my chemical secret which has the same effect as the climatic conditions in sections of the country where there is plenty of rain or rain at intervals."

The chemical combinations which Hatfield uses are naturally secret. Derricks are erected at suitable places—there are two in Sherman county—to which he carries water, which is evaporated by a chemical process, treated with electricity and permitted to evaporate.

The Hatfield chemical preparation arises and comes in contact with the rain bearing clouds. Precipitation follows. From July 1 to May 10 Hatfield and his brother are at work mixing the preparation which promises to make Sherman county, Oregon, one of the greatest wheat raising countries in the United States.

In February, 1904, when one of southern California's greatest dry spells was on, Mr. Hatfield offered to finance his own trials, and to produce 18 inches of rain in February, March and April for \$1000. The average rainfall for 12 months was 8.75 inches. Los Angeles records showed he got the 18 inches 30 days ahead of schedule time.

The Hatfields have gone to California. They will return to Oregon the latter part of April to resume their work in Sherman county, and for which the county tax will be levied.

Wine Jelly—Soak one box of gelatin in one cupful of cold water for an hour, and then add to it three cupfuls of sugar, the juice of two lemons and the grated peel of one and a good pinch of cinnamon. Let all stand together in a cool place for an hour. Turn over them a quart of boiling water, stir until the gelatin is entirely dissolved; add a pint of good sherry, strain through a flannel—do not

squeeze it—and turn into a mold wet with cold water. If the gelatin does not dissolve, put it over the fire for a moment until the liquid comes to a boil. Do this, of course, before the wine goes in.

Gooseberry Fool—Stew a quart of ripe gooseberries in just enough water to cover them, and when soft rub them through a colander. Take the pulp that goes through and beat into it a tablespoonful of butter, a cupful of sugar and the yolks of four eggs, well beaten. Heap it in a glass dish and put on top a meringue made by whipping the whites of the four eggs stiff with three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar.—The August Delineator.
