### DEMAND NEW WATER LAW.

During the legislative session of 1907 there were three big fights—the railroad commission bill, the banking code and the water code being the storm centers of as many different legislative hurricanes. The railroad law was passed because the people had demanded it in such strong tones that there was no denying them.

The banking code was passed after a fashion, but the irrigation code was defeated by a narrow margin in the house, after having been forced through the senate, principally owing to the stubborn fight of Kubli of Jackson, who was the avowed representative of water-power interests in southern Oregon, which were afraid of the effect of the law upon their perpetual and special privileges.

Since that time, as before, irrigation projects throughout the state have been retarded, hampered and greatly injured by the utter chaos of the Oregon water law, but if there is any potency in the demands of the people of the irrigation-needing portions of the state, of the state grange, of the natural resource conservation commission and of other people and business interests which are now in jeopardy because of the hopeless tangle in the water laws of the state, there will be a new water law enacted by the next legislature.

The state grange is pledged to secure the enactment of a water code and the legislative committee is now working up sentiment for the bill, having chosen the code bill defeated by a narrow margin at the last session of the legislature. The conservation commission has appointed a special committee to look after the enactment of water legislation.

### POWDERED EGGS.

The latest official reports received from the Atlantic fleet indicate satisfaction with the powdered egg preparation which was added to the list of preserved provisions furnished to the fleet on its departure from Hampton Roads. The article has apparently met a real need and it has established itself as a permanent ingredient of the naval ration, under conditions which make it impossible to obtain the fresh egg. The only complaint made against the preparation was on one of the ships where the crew expressed the opinion that fresh eggs would furnish a better omelet than powdered egg. A secret test was made and it was found that the criticism was based on imagination, and that, as a matter of fact, it was impossible to tell whether an omelet had been made of powdered eggs or of fresh eggs. The preparation has served admirably not only in the omelet form, but also when used in cakes and puddings.

### RETURNING PROSPERITY.

Reports from more than 30 states indicate that the long heralded business revival is making itself strongly felt in the middle and far west, while New England and the Atlantic states are recovering more slowly from the effects of the depression. Manufacturers and dealers west of Pittsburg report that the last two months have seen a marked increase in the volume of business and prospects for the future are very encouraging. In Chicago over 10,000 railroad men have gone back to work since the first of the year. Half of the men the packers laid off during the winter are back at their old places. There has been a marked falling off in the number of idle freight cars since the high mark which was reached in May. Reports from Milwaukee, Duluth, Detroit, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Kansas City and Denver are uniformly favorable. In all these cities men are finding good employment and business is on the increase. The south also reports progress.

Through an error charged to the

legislative codifying commission appointed to review the laws, the sensational charge is made that all the statutes of the new state of Oklahoma have been invalidated. Important changes were made by the commission, it is alleged, in the enrolled bills, kept in the secretary of state's office constituting the only legal record, to make them conform to engrossed bills and the legislative journals. The courts will have to pass on the question.

With 12 husbands either dead or divorced, Mrs. Phoebe Townsend, of Dodge, Neb., is now sued for divorce by her 14th husband, who charges her with cruelty. Mr. Townsend is 60 years old and Mrs. Townsend is 52. They were married as the result of an advertisement in a matrimonial journal. It is said that Mrs. Townsend cannot remember the names of all her husbands without reference to a note book.

Not content with overtopping the Eiffel Tower by a few feet, as will be done by the Mutual Life Insurance company's 62-story building under construction on lower Broadway, the report now comes from New York that plans are under way for a new skyscraper which will pierce the atmosphere to an elevation of 1000 feet, and which will be nearly 100 feet taller than the insurance company's structure.

The big event of the week in the field of politics will be the Taft notification meeting in Cincinnati today, when the Republican nominee will deliver his first speech in the campaign for the presidency. The event will be made an occasion for a big Republican demonstration which will be attended by individuals and marching clubs from many parts of the country.
