THE PRACTICAL SCHOOL.

The metropolis of Oregon has taken a long step in advance in its addition to the public schools of that city, and it is to be hoped that its example will soon be followed by school authorities of other sections of the state.

Portland's first free public School of Trades will open September 14, and it is expected that a full quota of pupils will be on hand to begin their new work.

The new School of Trades will be free to all boys, it being under the control of the same board that has charge of the city's other public institutions of learning.

In the new school boys will be taught pattern making, carpentering, electrical construction, machine shop practice, molding, mechanical and architectural drawing, arithmetic and English, but no foreign languages. Both the studies and the hours for taking them will be made to suit the boy as near as possible, instead of making the lad fit into a groove fixed by the school authorities. This institution is for the wage earner, for the rank and file of workers, instead of for the purpose of teaching boys that they are to be "bosses."

Modern machinery is being installed, all to be driven by electricity, and each machine to have its individual motor, thus making a workshop free from belting and shafting. Men who have had years of experience in Portland shops will be the instructors in the School of Trades.

GIVES FREEDOM TO HIMSELF.

Sultan Abdul Hamid has liberated himself from the 31 years of self-imposed bondage in the royal palace and in an official decree announced that henceforth he would appear on the streets as freely as any private citizen. A virtual prisoner since 1877, when he established absolutism, the sultan by the recent granting of a constitution to his people has also brought freedom to himself. He believes he can now appear in public with the utmost safety.

Closely following this decree was another, equally as startling to the representatives of the various powers and more significant in its possible bearing on European politics, that henceforth the prince's imperial family must observe monogamy. The sultan hopes by this to make the princes of Turkey eligible for marriage into the European dynasties. He believes the greatest protection the empire can have in the future would be a union of the members of the imperial family with the leading powers of Europe. These two innovations, coupled with the discarding of veils by the Turkish women, are the most remarkable and unusual results so far apparent of the new constitution.

As proof of the sincerity of the sultan's conversion to liberalism and his determination to regenerate Turkey it has been announced that he will probably tour Europe for a study of constitutional methods of government. This will be the most radical step ever taken by a Turkish ruler.

FULTON SETTLES TROUBLE.

In the last few days many things have developed in Oregon politics affecting both the Presidential campaign and the election of a United States Senator by the Legislature. In all of these matters, United States Senator Charles W. Fulton has been

prominent and his most important labor has been to quell the revolutionists who were plotting to remove W. M. Cake as state chairman, either through resignation or by expulsion. As a result of conferences it has been decided that Cake shall continue at the helm and direct the Taft campaign, with the assurance of a special executive board consisting of five members. This was taken up with Cake by wire, the latter being in Boston attending the Supreme Lodge of the Knights of Pythias.

On the Senatorial question Senator Fulton freely expressed his opinion and this was that the Legislature should not elect Geo. E. Chamberlain. "I do not believe that a Republican Legislature should elect a Democrat to the Senate," he said.

During his visit to Portland Senator Fulton has succeeded in blocking the game his friends put up to oust Cake as state chairman. For several weeks past a combination has been forming to make matters so tropical that Cake would resign, or this plan failing, it was determined to capture the state committee and throw him out as chairman. One of Fulton's closest friends says that the premature publication of the plans spoiled the game and made it necessary for Fulton to hurry to Portland to straighten out the situation and restore the harmony which his lieutenants were cooking.

S. C. Beach, who was the choice of one set of Fulton's followers to succeed Cake in the management of the campaign, asserts positively that he is not an aspirant for the position and does not want it.

MOST OF WOOL SOLD.

Clip Not as Large as Usual, But the Quality is Good.

J. Frankll, the wool buyer, reports that most of the choicest cuts are sold. About 1,225,000 pounds will be marketed here this fall, at about 14c.

The quality is good. The clip is short, because of the high prices prevailing last year for mutton, from \$5 to \$5.50, which induced many sheepmen to dispose of large portions of their flocks. Another reason for the shortage is due to the establishment of forest reserves and the vigilance of the rangers in limiting the number of sheep for pasturage thereon, which further reduced the flocks and consequent clip. In the long run, however, this way proves a benefit, as the quality of both the sheep and their clip will be better, owing to the sheep being in a less crowded range. —Lake County Examiner.

FIRST GOLD BRICK.

Mine Owner of Hoag District Sends Out First Gold.

The Alturas Plaindealer says that Mr. Grigsby, of the Hoag mining district, near New Pine Creek, 15 miles south of Lakeview, has finally made a complete clean up from his arasta.

It will be remembered that Mr. Grigsby built an arasta for the purpose of determining the kind of a mill required to save the values in his mine. Six tons of ore were run through, the arasta saving only one-third the assay value. These tailings were saved and cyanided and 96 per cent was saved. The yield from the six tons resulted in a brick weighing a fraction over \$1000.
