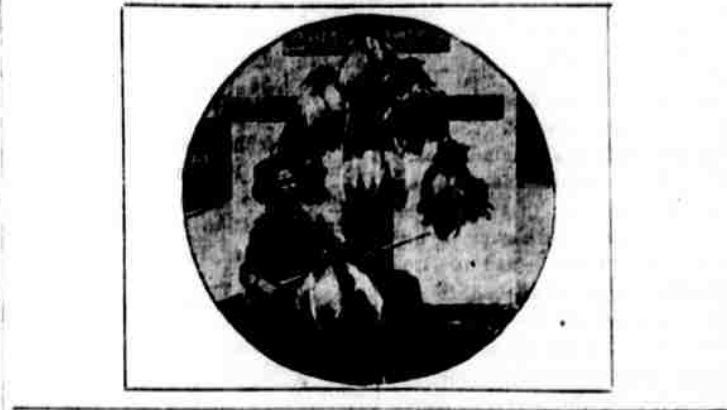

Klamath County's Lakes and Streams Are Alive With Trout and Water Fowl While the Mountains Abound With Deer, Bear and Other Big Game

The Klamath region is destined to become the mecca of the Pacific Coast lover of outdoor sports and will be visited annually by thousands of tourists. Its chain of lakes, mountain streams and rivers are matchless among waters of the United States for trout fishing and unsurpassed for water fowl that occupy the marshes as hatching grounds. Waters



of the lakes and rivers abound with the best species of trout and other game fish. In the forests of the mountains are found many species of wild game and fowl.

The basin is environed by snow-capped peaks of the Cascade Range, and to the southwest, at a distance of about seventy miles, Mount Shasta



the northernmost peak of the Sierras, rears its white crest to an altitude of 14,440 feet. Mount McLaughlin (Mount Pitt) is the highest of the eminences to the north and west, being about 8,000 feet. the lake is situated rises some 8000 feet above sea level. The lake was first discovered in 1862, and for a long time was called "Lake Majesty," until the more appropriate name it now bears was applied to it. This is one of the places impossible to picture with pen or brush.
