OREGON ASSESSMENTS

Inequalities in Methods in Vogue Throughout the State.

A remarkable inequality of assessment exists throughout the state, according to a table published in a recent issue of the Telegram. For instance:

"In increase in assessment of 1907 over 1901, seven years ago, Columbia county leads with 900 per cent, with Harney at the other end with only 8 per cent. Linn is given as 180, Lane's 200, Benton 119, Multnomah 285, Umatilla 600, Tillamook 400, Wheeler 84, etc., a variance that is startling.

"The increase in railroad value is also startling. Linn's went up from \$2,700 per mile in 1901 to \$13,700 in 1907. Columbia leads with an increase of from \$2,000 to \$40,000. Multnomah's is from \$5,000 to \$40,000; Douglas \$5,000 to \$25,000; Umatilla \$3,500 to \$35,000. The lowest is Wallowa county with \$1,000. On the west side the present ranges from \$7,500 in Benton county to \$11,500 in Yamhill on the same roadbed. There is also a big advance in hogs, sheep, cattle, and horses. Hogs range from \$1 in Coos county to \$7 in Washington and Umatilla; cattle from \$8 in Union and Baker to \$27 in Washington; horses from \$17 in Lake to \$50 in Columbia."
