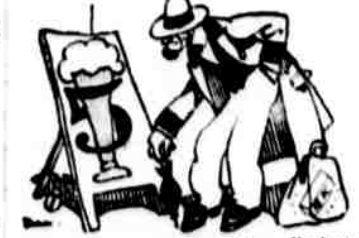

## OPINION OF A NEW YORK MAN

Says Crater Lake Surpasses Yosemite, Yellowstone park, Niagara Falls or Mammoth Caves of Kentucky

(Medford Tribune.)

While my opinion may not be that of an artist, still I should say that for grandeur, for true scenic beauty, Crater lake surpasses the wonderful Yosemite valley of California. Never before was I so entranced as that moment when the waters of Crater lake spread before my view, and I say this after visiting Yosemite, Yellowstone park, Niagara Falls, the Mammoth caves in Kentucky and other places of scenic wonders in America. It is the wonderful color of the water, I think, that took away my breath, also the majestic cliffs, the wonderful strength of the mountains, when I recall my first view of the lake.

Such was the tribute paid to southern Oregon's natural wonder, beautiful Crater lake, by Howard S. Reside, president of the American Security & Trust company of New York, upon his return Sunday evening from his trip to the lake.

Mr. Reside was unfortunate in his endeavor to bag a bear and bring back a look of two, but nevertheless he is satisfied with his trip.

"I intend," continued Mr. Reside, "to return to southern Oregon next summer and bring with me a number of my New York friends, including

my wife and family. I know of a number of people I can start in this direction and I am certain that they will agree with me that Crater lake is the grandest natural wonder in these United States. When we come next July it will be for two months' camping in this section of Oregon. I want another chance at your hunting and will also cast a few flies and see if I can land a few of the steel-heads that sport in the Rogue river. "I am much interested in the movement to have a highway built to the lake from Medford, such as is talked about, and I am going to lend my aid with both a subscription and my influence. Congressman Fitzgerald of Long Island, N. Y., is my son-in-law, and you watch his vote in regard to an appropriation by Congress with which to aid the project. There are also one or two others I think I can induce to support a substantial appropriation for such work.

"Only one natural wonder under the domain of Uncle Sam can approach it, and that is the active volcano, Kilauea, on the island of Hawaii, in the Hawaiian islands. There is a wonder that appeals to you by virtue of its activity and molten rock. Crater lake appeals to the aesthetic sense primarily."

### EXPERIMENTAL MATRIMONY.

Trial Marriage Is the Rule Among Many Peoples.

Among many people of the world trial marriages are the accepted custom. Among the Greeks "marriage is considered only as a temporary convenience, not binding on the parties more than one year," the consequence being that "a large proportion of the old and middle aged men by frequent changing have had many wives, and their children, scattered around the country, are unknown to them." Evidences of similar practices of experimental matrimony and connubial variety are found among many of the American Indian tribes on both continents.

In parts of Greenland six months is the trial dead line, husband and wife separating if the "two-hearts-two-minds" theory develops discord instead of harmony.

Marriage among the Botocudos, according to Keane, is of a purely temporary nature, "dissolved on the slightest pretext or without any pretext at all merely through love of change or caprice."

"In Tasmania," says Dr. Milligan, "trial marriages result in a succession of wives."

In Samoa the wife's tenure of office is frequently limited to a few days or weeks, and marriage is sometimes only an excuse for the feasts and festivals so dear to the hearts of the pleasure loving natives.

In the Indian archipelago it is a common practice for formal marriages to be limited, sometimes for only a month and at others for a period of several years.—Schoolcraft.

### MAYFLOWER TEAPOTS.

A Warning That May Prove of Value to Relic Hunters.

It may be trusted that no liberal descendant of the pilgrims would and no other person foolishly should ever claim to have or to have seen a teapot that had come over on the Mayflower. Whatever other articles in whatever number may be discovered as parts of the sacred cargo that was landed at Plymouth rock in 1620, relic hunters may rest in the assurance that no rival owns a teapot of Mayflower descent.

The explanation is simple. When the Mayflower sailed for America an ounce of tea was rare enough to have made up a fitting gift for royalty. Yet forty years later the wealthy and fashionable people of England were fairly familiar with tea which the East India company had first brought into the country, and four years later it was on sale in the coffee houses, at which time a pound might be purchased for the moderate sum of 60 shillings.

Only twenty five years later tea was on sale in Boston, and soon after there were two tea houses besides those kept by Daniel Vernon and Benjamin Harris. In the first decade of the eighteenth century it could be bought from Zabell Bolton at his apothecary shop.

Today the coffee houses of a hundred years ago in London are in reality tea houses. In England were made the first teapots of pottery. Later the most delicate creations in porcelain appeared, but as tea became popular the art of the teapot maker was less exclusively refined.—Boston Globe.

### DARING BELL RINGERS.

Pranks of the Athletic Young Spaniards of Seville.

There is a curious custom among the young Spaniards of the city of Seville. On certain fete days, related a tourist, the young men of the place have permission to ring the bells in the clock towers of the cathedral. They have an ingenious and original way of ringing them. While the regular bell ringers repose these amateurs climb up on to the bells, throw them forward with all their force and ride upon the bells in their furious swinging to and fro. We may imagine what an uproar is produced when all the bells of a cathedral are being treated in this manner. Any man who is able may exercise his skill, and the duration of the ringing depends upon the caprice or the strength and patience of the ringers.

The spectacle is very strange of the great bells swinging, with one, two or more bold ringers hanging from them in any attitude which seems to them best adapted to pushing out the most noise. In the Gironda, at Seville, the first time I witnessed this, the clamor was frightful. When I looked up I thought at first some unfortunate was entangled in the bell rope, but I soon found it was a matter of sport. Another ringer appeared suspended in the air, holding the bell by the ears or the rim or the wooden framework and following it in all its movements, sometimes feet, sometimes head downward. Such are the daring bell ringers of Seville.

### The Egyptian Mummy.

Egyptologists have discovered that among the ancient Egyptians the inviolate preservation of the body was deemed absolutely essential to the corporeal resurrection of the dead. According to the teaching of the Egyptian priests, the living man consisted of a body, a soul, an intelligence and an appendage called "Ka."
