CHANGE IN SENATE.

The terms of thirty-one senators will expire the third day of next March, and it has already been settled that some of them will not be returned. Primary elections have sealed the fate of some, and others have been eliminated by one process or other. The strength of the movement against those tendencies in government and in the affairs that the President has termed "reactionary," has weakened the hold of a number of senators on their offices.

How strong the sentiment is and how effectively it is working was shown in the Iowa result a few weeks ago. In this, Senator William R. Allison, recently deceased, the oldest member of the Senate in point of service and one of its strongest members, escaped defeat by a remarkably narrow margin. The campaign argument against him was that he was affiliated with the forces of reaction. Though Senator Allison was running for the seventh consecutive term and ordinarily would have been elected without opposition, the feeling that he had not stood for progressive legislation as he should have done made the campaign against him possible.

The latest senator to go down in defeat is Henry C. Hansbrough of North Dakota, who has been beaten in the primaries of his state. Senator Hansbrough's enemies raised the cry of being a corporation candidate, and Thomas F. Marshall led the balloting. Mr. Hansbrough is chairman of the Senate public lands committee and has taken an important part in Senate affairs. It is one of the strange features of Senator Hansbrough's turning down that a study of his votes shows he has almost invariably voted against the wishes of the Senate Republican leaders in railroad matters and matters where corporation questions were involved. Yet his enemies waged a campaign against him on the ground that he was a railroad and corporation man and succeeded in beating him.

Senator Fulton of Oregon has been beaten in the primaries, and Governor George E. Chamberlain, a Democrat, is expected to succeed him. Senator Alfred B. Kittredge of South Dakota was recently beaten in the primaries by Governor Cot I. Crawford.

Senator Thomas C. Platt of New York will, of course, drop out of politics March 3, 1909. His state is tired of him and anxious to see him eliminated.

Senator Levi Ankeny of Washington is another senator whose term will end next March and who may not return. He is strongly opposed by Representative Wesley L. Jones. The fight is a hard one and the outcome not certain. Jones, however, is a strong man and has the better of the situation up to date.

JUDGES DIFFER.

In discussing the injunction sued out by the liquor interests of independence to prevent the county court of Polk county from making an order declaring Polk county dry, as a result of the last June election, Judge Galloway, in open court at Dallas, took just the opposite view of the construction of the state statutes to that of Judge H. K. Hanna of the circuit court for Jackson county when the latter ruled that the charter of Medford, which gave the city exclusive control and regulation of the liquor traffic and repealed all acts in conflict with its provisions, took precedence over the local option law.
