### "ALASKA WHEAT" CANARD.

The confidence of farmers in the Idaho experiment station suffered a severe shock when it was discovered that the much-discussed "Alaska" wheat is not of the high quality indicated by the report of L. S. Jones, chemist at the Idaho station, who tested a sample. The disclosure that been either careless or mercenary did the experiment station authorities had not injure the reputation of the station more, however, than has the effort of the station to escape responsibility for its part in misleading farmers who might be induced to pay fancy prices for seed of the new variety. Instead of admitting that they had been duped or had been careless, the Idaho experiment station officials endeavor to create the impression that the report of the chemist did not read as it was reported in the press, but the explanations are plainly insufficient for the purpose.

### STATE OF IOWA MAY GO DRY.

Iowa canted, decanted and recanted" is the working of prohibition in that state is summed up in Appleton's magazine for September by Trumbull White, who has observed the working of the Iowa anti-liquor law for the past 29 years. According to his conclusions, the situation is much like that in reference in race-track gambling in New York before Governor Hughes forced the anti-gambling act through the legislature. That is to say, the selling of liquor is forbidden by the law of the state, but is permitted by another law through the device of imposing a fine which amounts to no more than a license fee.

This measure, which is known in Iowa as the mule law, provides for the virtual suspension of the prohibitory statutes if the written consent of a majority of the legal voters in a city or 65 per cent of the voters of a county is obtained. When this is done licenses may be issued by the local authorities, the state license fee being \$600, while the cities may charge additionally whatever they choose.

Under this system about one-fourth of the counties of Iowa, including most of the counties along the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, in which the majority of the cities of the state are located, have legalized liquor selling. It is, therefore, erroneous to speak of Iowa as a prohibition state, for a large proportion of the population live in communities where saloons are allowed to run openly and legally, although the prohibition laws passed 25 years ago never have been repealed, and in some of the rural counties are still enforced.

An organized movement is now under way to submit a constitutional amendment providing for prohibition to the voters of Iowa. Prohibitionists themselves declare that if this is done the amendment will be carried by from 30,000 to 50,000 majority. On the other hand, those who are opposed to prohibition insist that public sentiment has been growing against a prohibitory law ever since the present law was passed, and that a vote of the state would cause it to return to the license system.

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careful and accurate chemical test might easily be misleading if the report of it should be so loosely written as to permit two widely varying interpretations. A report of this character having been sent out by the Idaho station and having been made the means of misleading newspapers and farm papers as well as wheat growers the station authorities should be manly enough to acknowledge the error instead of trying to make poor explanations. If improper use has been made of the report issued by the Idaho chemist, those persons who have so used it should be exposed and prosecuted if possible—Oregonian.
