UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.

The University will issue in a short time the second number of its bulletin on Correspondence Study Courses. The correspondence work last year met with so encouraging a reception and the demand for it was so great that this department has been greatly strengthened and many new courses are being offered. It is believed that 200 students will enroll for this work between now and the first of February.
The first two days registration at the University of Oregon has been the greatest in the history of the institution. Already nearly 475 students have enrolled, which is greater than the total enrollment for the whole of last year. A large number of old students will return within the next two weeks and the total enrollment for the year will reach 550, or an increase of 30 per cent over last year.
Coach Robert W. Forbes, the famous Yale end, who was hired by the Associated Students of the University of Oregon to coach their football team, is making a great hit with his men. Fifty men are turning out for practice daily.
The Freshman class numbers 250 members.
An extraordinary gathering began in New York City on Monday, made up of the delegates from various parts of the country to take part in a four days' conference. They came on the brakebeams of freight cars, blind baggage of the swift express or straggled over dusty roads. They profess to represent the country's workless, and to constitute the "first National convention of the unemployed." Many prominent men were invited to make addresses among them W. J. Bryan, Judge Taft and John E. Redmond, the Irish leader, who is at present in this country. All of these gentlemen excused themselves on the ground of other demands. J. Eads How, known as the "millionaire hobo," is at the head of the organization.

Health Commissioner Connell of Omaha has sent out the following warning to Omaha's citizens: "Prepare to resist a scourge of cholera." He believes that the plague is certain to visit the United States, and already the health department has begun a defensive campaign to resist the ravages.

The Zust Italian car, after completing the race from New York to Paris and undergoing untold hardships and batterings, caught fire and was destroyed a dozen miles from London while running on a smooth highway. The machine was being returned to Paris, after having been on exhibition at the Franco-English exposition when the accident occurred.

Speyer & Co., it is reported, are to advance \$8,000,000 to the Rock Island for the purpose of taking on the \$7,124,000 of Frisco 4 1/2 per cent notes due December 1. It is said Harriman has been buying up Rock Island preferred and it is recalled that two weeks ago the Reid-Moore interests were heavy buyers of Southern Pacific. These rumors tend to confirm the report that the Southern Pacific would, before long, take the Frisco system off the Rock Island's hands. Rock Island shares have of late made sensational advances.

Under Brig.-Gen. William Crozier the ordnance bureau of the army has developed a new projectile which will carry 75 per cent farther than the projectiles now used by any army can be sent. It is said by officers it is as great an advance over the Dunnite powder as the Dunnite powder was an advance over the explosive powder that has until recently been used in shells. As at present in use, the extreme range of a shell is a mile to each inch in diameter—a 6-inch projectile can be thrown six miles and a 12-inch projectile 12 miles. The new shell can be given a fighting range greater than the extreme range of the same size projectile as at present used.

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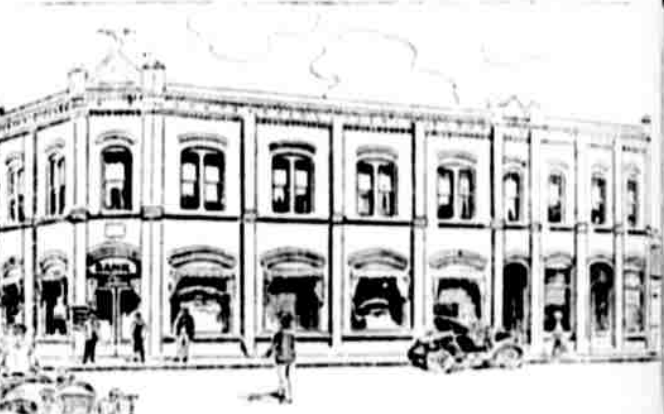
