Since the prohibition wave struck Georgia, it has been washing much flotsam and jetsam into the state legislature. Lawmakers of that commonwealth have suddenly become possessed of the idea that any sort of evil may be suppressed merely by passing bills prohibiting it. One of the early contributions to statesmanship during the present legislative session was a proposed statute putting the ban on mosquitos. Hotel keepers would be required by this measure to provide sleeping apartments fitted with both screens and mosquito netting. The idea was to make the law a real mosquito bar. The author declared that hundreds of traveling men of the state were being bled to death annually in the hotels and that their successors were crying for remedial legislation. This prohibitory bill has been followed by another almost as unique. George Glenn, Whitfield county's representative in the lower house, is the author. Mr. Glenn would prohibit feminine lures. He wants it made a cause of divorce for a woman to inveigle a man into matrimony by the use of certain styles of clothes and perfumes. His bill, he says, is aimed at deceit. He wants women to publicly confess that they are thin and straight when such is the case. He would prohibit the use of pads and padding. If a woman's hair is thin, Mr. Glenn believes she ought to be willing to admit it, and therefore he adds the use of switches and false puffs and artificial curls and rats and rolls to his catalogue of feminine crimes. He doesn't state what effect high heels have on susceptible men, but he lists these with other sins. It is less difficult to understand why there might be objections to "variegated drop stitch or rainbow hosiery," because they may draw the attention from defects elsewhere. And one can understand that Mr. Glenn fears the use of "scents and perfumes" might be made the substitute of a needed bath, but when he puts false teeth under the ban he becomes deliberately and maliciously cruel. Even the men will protest against this. If the poor women are to be denied the privilege of eating and of smiling, how much more serious the mother-in-law problem is going to be! By all means, Mr. Glenn, amend this bill to exclude false teeth.

Not many men who have been lynched live to tell the tale, and not many would care to. There is, however, in Sunset, La., a negro who has not only survived an experience of this nature, but has returned to the community where the lynching occurred and is living peacefully with the members of his own race who attempted to kill him. He was hanged for ten minutes to the limb of a tree and the muscles of his neck were paralyzed in consequence. Physicians at a New Orleans hospital treated him so successfully that he is now reported to be enjoying his old time health. The negro's name is Argo Notty, and, according to his statement, he recently gave a supper to the pastor and a number of members of the church that he attends. Watermelon and fried chicken brought out all the invited guests. While the company was seated at the table, the house was surrounded by a party of armed negroes who seized Notty and, aided by the beneficiaries of his hospitality, placed him in a buggy. The buggy, guarded by pastor and congregation, was taken to a lonely spot in the woods, where a rope was thrown on Notty's neck, one end tied to the limb of a tree and the vehicle driven from under him. The mob left Notty dangling from the limb, but a friend, who followed at a distance, rushed to his assistance as soon as the crowd had left and cut Notty down. He was revived and put on a New Orleans train, and treatment was given him on his arrival at his destination in the Charity hospital. Notty's offense, his would-be executioners say, consisted in shooting another negro from ambush. The negro, also a member of the lynching congregation, was only slightly wounded. The moral of this tale would seem to be that when a church wishes to get rid of a lackluder, it should appoint a committee to wait under the execution tree until the accused is unquestionably well on his way to that reputed final home of the ungodly.

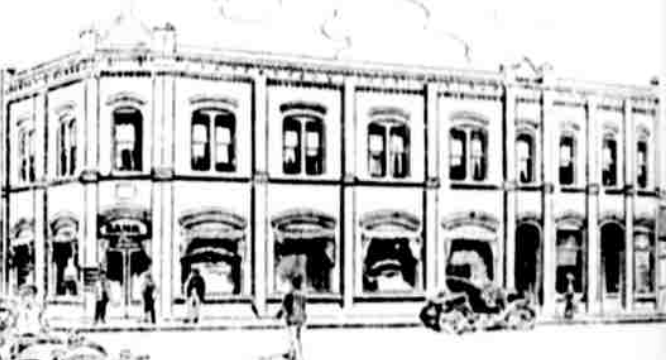
