Preliminary work on a subway system for Chicago is to be begun soon and full details of the plans will be worked out. A sum of \$50,000 has been set aside by the city council to furnish clerks to carry on the work of the transportation committee who have the scheme under consideration. The money was voted from the city's traction receipts and, although the information concerning the work that has already been done was not furnished the councilmen, they voted the transfer of the funds without a dissenting voice when they were told that the money would enable the committee to push subway plans.

Col. Goethals, head of the Isthmian Canal Commission, who has just arrived in Washington, says the Panama Canal will be finished by January 15, 1915. Col. Goethals took charge of the work on April 1, 1907, and has been on the Isthmus ever since. Up to the time he assumed charge the largest single month's excavation had been 1,160,000 cubic yards. Since that time the excavation never has run less than that amount, and during the eight months of the present year the average was 3,487,287 cubic yards. To September 1 of this year the total excavation was 47,347,431 cubic yards, which is a trifle over a third of the total estimate. There are probably 6,000 Americans who are voters on the canal at the present time. None of these will be able to vote, but Col. Goethals says he has given his permission for a mock election to be held November 2. The mock election, he said, is causing almost as much interest to be taken as if it were the real thing.

According to the telegraph, Michael Housham of Cleveland, sold his wife's household furniture to a boarder in the house for \$15, and he threw in his four children. Then he went away. His wife has asked the police to help her find him. She says (according to the telegraph) "There was the wash tub, two chairs, the bed, and me, all for \$15; too cheap!"

The Grace Memorial Presbyterian church of Pittsburg, Pa., has a renovating committee, whose duty it is to shake the carpets, polish up the altar, etc. The renovating committee got up a picnic to raise money for a new carpet and advertised dancing. The preacher got out an injunction restraining the members of his flock from giving a dance. His act has resulted in a split in the church.

Within ten days preliminary work will be started on the new city hall in San Francisco that is to replace the ruins of the costly structure destroyed two years and a half ago. City Engineer Manson was instructed to present specifications providing for the razing of the mass of shattered brick and twisted steel. The recent bond issue provided \$25,000 for the purpose.

Letters characterizing as "absurd" Dr. LeGrand Norton Denslow's claims that he can cure locomotor ataxia and protesting against the reading by him of a paper to that effect before the Academy of Medicine have been received by Dr. John A. Wyeth, president of the academy, from several New York neurologists. Dr. H. Sachs, president of the Neurological Society, is among those bitterly opposed to Dr. Denslow's stand. "It would not be worth while to comment on Dr. Denslow's views if his statements had not been made at a regular meeting of the academy and given wide publicity," said Dr. Sachs in his letter. "His contentions are too absurd to be discussed and in a secular journal such discussion would be improper or impossible. I am amazed that he should have made such statements before a sane body of physicians." Dr. Joseph Collins and Dr. E. B. Fisher also made protests.

At the opening of the 79th semi-annual conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, it was unanimously voted to pledge the entire membership of the church for prohibition legislation.

Hold on to your chairs! Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw has announced her intention of making a tour of the high schools of the country for the purpose of giving talks to the girls. She says she wants to give them some "sound advice."

Senator Bourne has engaged a 22-room apartment at Stoneleigh Court for the coming winter. This is the largest single apartment in Washington, and Stoneleigh Court is the most expensive apartment house here. Senator Bourne, it is said, expects to entertain extensively during the coming season.

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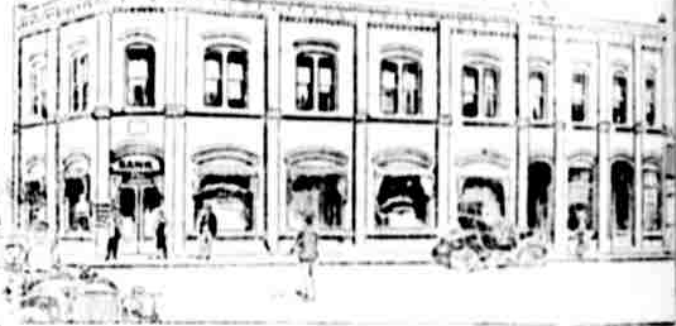
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
