The denial by John D. Rockefeller that he had any wrong intention in investing in the stock of railroads that granted rebates to the Standard Oil company has been taken with a barrel of salt by many citizens. Circumstantial evidence seems to convict him. The situation recalls a story told regarding Senator Vest, who, once upon a time, was defending a man accused of a crime to which there had been no actual witnesses. "This case reminds me of a boyhood friend," he told the jury. "The lad stole and ate a custard pie. Desiring to avert suspicion from himself, he seized the family cat, smeared its paws and mouth with custard and then took the animal into the back yard and shot her, observing: 'There goes one more victim of circumstantial evidence.'" It is needless to add that the senator's client was acquitted.

According to those who have seen most of the disease in the Philippine Islands, leprosy is not contagious, and is hardly infectious. Lieut. Chas. E. MacDonald, of the army medical corps, has just sent to Dr. Isadore Dyer, of New Orleans, fresh proofs that the disease is really a rare form of tuberculosis, contracted from infected sea food. It has often been observed that persons afflicted with leprosy have lived on diseased fish and clams. That the disease is not spread from its human host or by bad sanitation has been demonstrated

Dr. MacDonald says, among the leprosy of Samar. Next year a congress will be convened at Bergen, Norway, at which it is hoped that the professional and lay delusions about leprosy will be cleared away.

HOW SAWDUST IS USED.

Sawdust is one of the puzzling wastes in lumbering operations. The waste is serious, too, for the kerf—the part cut out by the saw in the mill and transformed into sawdust—always bears a rather high ratio to the boards obtained. In cutting thin

stuff one-fourth of the log, or even more, may be kerf. Efforts to turn sawdust into pulp for the paper mills have usually been unsuccessful on account of mechanical difficulties in handling. In several European countries, however, a new way has been found of turning sawdust to account. The sawdust, chiefly pine and fir, is ground with millstones, exactly as old-time mills made corn meal or wheat or rye flour. Expensive machinery is not required, but it is necessary to take special precautions against fires which might start from sparks between the mill stones. Sawdust flour is sold to dynamite factories, to be mixed with nitroglycerin, and forms the body or absorbent for that high explosive. It is also in demand for the manufacture of cheap blotting papers. The mills in the Harz Mountains, in Germany, an important manufacturing center, are kept busy meeting this demand. The price of the "flour" in Germany ranges from \$7.50 to \$12.50 a ton. It is shipped in bags, like meal, or in bales of about 10 cubic feet, made by means of high pressure.

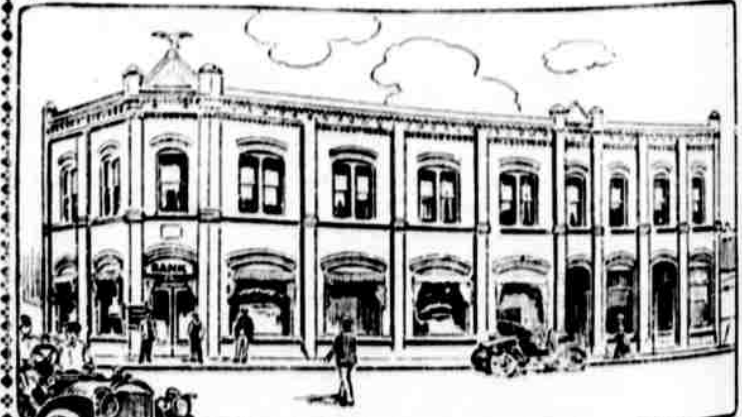
