

SMOKING BY BOYS ILLEGAL

Grand Jury May Be Asked to Investigate Offenders of Anti-Cigarette Law

There is one law on the statute books besides the local option law which has received the attention of the grand jury before they complete their labors. The matter has received considerable discussion and an effort is being made to have the law enforced.

This is in regard to boys using pipes and cigarettes. It is a well known fact that perhaps hundreds of boys in this city are disobeying the law in this respect, as well as dealers in tobacco. The law reads as follows:

Section 1239.—It shall be unlawful to sell, barter, trade, give or in any other manner furnish to any minor, under the age of 18 years, any tobacco, or any cigarette in any form, or any compound in which tobacco forms an important part, without the written consent or order of such minor's parent or guardian, and when such parent or guardian, then that case consent may be given by a county court sitting for the transaction of county business, upon application in the county in which the minor may have his residence, by a person residing in the precinct in which he shall upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

AT MERRILL TOO

At a meeting of the town council of Saturday night, the license non-compliance of John Hatfield and Frank Bloomcamp was returned until such time as the parties shall give suitable bonds in accordance with the recent

ordinance passed by that body. The matter of raising the marshal's salary to \$50 per month was also discussed, but nothing definite was done. The Mayor announced that the taxable property in the city limits was something less than \$50,000. A ten mill tax was levied for the payment of current expenses, but as the annual expenditure of the city is something in excess of \$1200, a larger tax will have to be imposed. Kansas Plans Reform in Road Building

Big strides in road building will be taken by the state of Kansas, according to statements by Walter Roscoe Stubbs, the newly elected governor, who takes office after the first of the new year. Of course there will not be highways across the entire state at first, but the eastern part of Kansas is to build roads, by a systematic plan, so that each link will help to form chains of continuous roads. The project suggested by the new governor include a road from Kansas City to Lawrence and thence to Topeka, the capital of the state. Another project is to mark the old Santa Fe trail, already staked out through the whole of Kansas with red granite monuments, with a permanent road. This road was selected for its moderate gradient and the old route, macadamized, would make one of the finest highways in the country. When the new governor takes office it is understood that there will be in his message a paragraph asking the legislature to create the office of highway engineer or commissioner, so that a comprehensive plan of road building may be once he begun. Material is close at hand, so far as regards the eastern counties of the state. The dirt roads farther west will be given the best treatment devised for their soils.
