

CONCRETE BUILDINGS

Machine Shipped and Company Is Being Formed to Manufacture Cement Blocks for Building Purposes

The first steps have been taken in this city for the formation of a company for the manufacture of concrete blocks for building purposes. The machinery has been ordered by a number of local capitalists and word has been received that the same was shipped yesterday from Denver. Within a week a corporation will be formed to manufacture and handle the product. A pressed brick machine will be added to the equipment of the company.

In view of the great amount of building in prospect for the next few years, there is a large field for a company of this nature. Concrete and cement buildings are fast taking the place of structures of all other material, and it is found to be even cheaper than brick. All of the modern buildings in the city are now being built of cement blocks or reinforced concrete, which is found to be more durable and to present a much neater appearance.

The manufacture of pressed brick will also be greatly appreciated by those contemplating erecting buildings as it is for superior to hand made product. Great convenience and satisfaction have resulted in the past over the necessity of using the quality of brick which is obtainable here on account of its softness and unsightly roughness and surface. The prospects are bright in Klamath Falls for any company which can put up buildings on an equality with those of the large cities.

NEW SCHOOL NEEDED

Present Handsome Stone Building Overcrowded--Will Be Necessary to Provide Another Building Next Year

P. L. Fountain, one of the directors of the city schools, stated that it will be absolutely necessary to erect a new school building in this city next year. The present handsome stone structure was built three years ago, but already it is filled to overflowing, and the accommodations are inadequate to the increased attendance of school children.

Miss Pool, one of the Primary teachers, has over fifty scholars under her charge, while Miss Jensen's room is crowded to its full capacity. Every available space has been taken up with desks in order to give the children seating accommodations, and it is stated that there is not sufficient room for hearing recitations.

The Primary grade is to be divided and three classes formed, and for the use of the third class a room has been fitted up in the basement. This is the best that can be done to take care of the children and it is hoped the school will get through this year. It is asserted, however, that another year the present building will not begin to hold all the scholars, and undoubtedly action will be taken in the near future preparatory to the erection of a second building in another location in the town.
