MAYFLOWER TEAPOTS.

A Warning That May Prove of Value to Relic Hunters.

It may be trusted that no lineal descendant of the pilgrims would and no other person foolishly should ever claim to have or to have seen a teapot that had come over on the Mayflower. Whatever other articles in whatever number may be treasured as parts of the sacred cargo that was landed at Plymouth rock in 1620, relic hunters may rest in the assurance that no rival owns a teapot of Mayflower descent.

The explanation is simple. When the Mayflower sailed for America an ounce of tea was rare enough to have made up a fitting gift for royalty. Yet forty years later the wealthy and fashionable people of England were fairly familiar with tea which the East India company had first brought into the country, and four years later it was on sale in the coffee houses, at which time a pound might be purchased for the moderate sum of 60 shillings.

Only twenty-five years later tea was on sale in Boston, and soon after there were two tea houses besides those kept by Daniel Vernon and Benjamin Harris. In the first decade of the eighteenth century it could be bought from Zabdiel Boston at his apothecary shop.

Today the coffee houses of a hundred years ago in London are in reality tea houses. In England were made the first teapots of pottery. Later the most delicate creations in porcelain appeared, but as tea became popular the art of the teapot maker was less exclusively refined.—Boston Globe.

DARING BELL RINGERS.

Pranks of the Athletic Young Spaniards of Seville.

There is a curious custom among the young Spaniards of the city of Seville. On certain festive days, related a tourist, the young men of the place have permission to ring the bells in the clock towers of the cathedral. They have an ingenious and original way of ringing them. While the regular bell ringers repose these amateurs climb up on to the bells, throw them forward with all their force and ride upon the bells in their furious swinging to and fro. We may imagine what an uproar is produced when all the bells of a cathedral are being treated in this manner. Any man who is able may exercise his skill, and the duration of the ringing depends upon the caprice or the strength and patience of the ringers.

The spectacle is very strange of the great bells swinging, with one, two or more bold ringers hanging from them in any attitude which seems to them best adapted to pushing out the most noise. In the Giralda, at Seville, the first time I witnessed this, the clamor was frightful. When I looked up I thought at first some unfortunate was entangled in the bell rope, but I soon found it was a matter of sport. Another ringer appeared suspended in the air, holding the bell by the ears or the rim or the wooden framework and following it in all its movements, sometimes feet, sometimes head, downward. Such are the daring bell ringers of Seville.

The foundations of the famous cathedral at Strasburg are shaking some what, causing a crack in one of the 400 foot pillars supporting the tower.

Between 1888 and 1905 nearly 600 congregational Sunday schools were established in forty-seven states and territories, out of which have grown 1,579 churches.

The Indiana bureau of statistics shows that during 1907 persons joined the churches of the state at the rate of nearly 194 a day, the church membership having increased 70,450 during the year.

Rev. John H. Sileman, one of the ablest and most eloquent preachers of the Methodist church, has resigned the presidency of Williamette university of Salem, Ore., and returned again to the Troy (N. Y.) conference.

College and School.

A decree has been published in all the schools of China warning students not to take an interest in politics, contribute to newspapers or read novels.

Bowdoin college, at Brunswick, Me., has just severed the last bond that allied it with any religious organization, and for the first time in fifty years it has no connection with any denomination through the use of its money.

When Harvard, our oldest university, was only an idea in the minds of a few English colonists, the University of San Marcos, in Peru, which is still flourishing, was a well established institution already older than Cornell is today.

Train and Track.

On the early railways in England a lighted candle at night in a station house window meant "stop." Its absence was a signal to go on.

The railways of Nova Scotia, other than the Dominion and Atlantic and the Halifax Southwestern, both having a mileage of 300 miles, are primarily coal roads, and passengers and freight are only incidentals.

Twenty new locomotives have been ordered for the French railway lines in Algiers, and it is believed that more will be needed before the end of the year. From regions supposed to be parts of the desert these railways hauled last year 60,000 tons of grain.
