

## TRIAL OF LISKEY

(Concluded from Page 1.)

Rube Vinson, the son of Henry Vinson, was next placed on the stand and testified in regard to seeing the horses in question at San Jose, in January, 1909, and that they had previously been seen by him in Langgill Valley; that they were the property of the Vinson's and had been shipped out without the permission of the owners.

Attorney Mills objected to practically every question asked the witness and in every instance the Court overruled the objections interposed. Miss Annie Vinson, daughter of Henry Vinson, testified that she visited San Jose in January of this year and in company of the Klamath County officers she visited certain feed stables where she saw the same horses testified to by the witness preceding her.

Numerous objections were made by counsel for defense, all of which were overruled by Judge Noland.

W. H. Shook, of Dairy, gave evidence that he saw a certain gray horse belonging to Geo. Ritter in San Jose and that at the same time he saw there a number of the Vinson horses.

After an intermission of nearly an hour W. H. Shook was again called and asked in regard to the condition of certain fences on the Walters ranch. He testified that the wires had been cut on several fences and that there were marks showing that a band of horses had passed through the openings.

W. C. Dalton, residing east of Tule Lake, testified that on his ranch he found a number of fences on which the wires had been cut, leading to the lava beds, and the Redding road.

John W. Logue, whose residence is some eight miles north of Dairy, and who is the father-in-law of Alf Wallis, testified that on about December 5, 1908, he saw the roan pony sent to San Jose in the Wallis pasture and that it was subsequently

turned out with other horses by Wallis and Liskey.

S. L. Walker, a deputy sheriff, gave evidence which corroborated the testimony of the witness Welch and W. H. Shook in regard to visiting the Chas. Liskey and the Alf. Wallis ranches in company with the witnesses. He testified in regard to finding the cover of a cracker box in a badger hole near a pine tree which Welch pointed out, saying they had a lunch hidden there. The article was placed on exhibition. Mr. Walker also testified that this brand of crackers is sold by the Bradley store at Bonanza.

Prosecution practically completed its evidence and case was continued until Tuesday morning at which time the prosecution will finish its case.

Attorney Mills gave notice that as soon as the state rested its case he would offer a motion asking that the case be dismissed on account of the variance of the testimony from the charges in the indictment and opening statement.

During the afternoon session the crowd was so large that much of the time spectators were forced to stand. The mother of the defendant sat by his side during the entire session. She was not affected when damaging evidence was introduced and her bearing is such as would indicate implicit confidence in her son's innocence.
