DAIRY ASSOCIATION APPOINTS COMMITTEES—NOW READY FOR BUSINESS.

The Klamath County Dairy Association held its final organization meeting in the city last Saturday forenoon. The meeting was not specially attended owing very largely to the busy season rapidly opening for farm work. There was not, however a lack of interest, and already some of the committees appointed are actively at work on assigned duties and are making favorable reports.

Crew of 100 Men Work All Saturday Night and Sunday Driving Piles for Bridge and Laying Ties and Rails

In fact, lay the foundation for the success of dairying in the county. It is desired that all parties desiring to purchase dairy animals make their wants known to the livestock committee. This committee wishes to keep in touch with the livestock needs of the district and do all in its power to get dairy stock into the county. C. G. Merrill, a member of his committee, has already sent out for one lot of dairy animals; J. P. Adams has 50 head on hand, and Dr. Gisher is in California with a promise to inform the association of any good animals coming to his notice. A gentleman from the Middle West is making inquiry regarding the chance to establish a breeding farm for dairy stock here, and states that he could come with 100 animals. These are matters which the association desires to carefully attend to for the benefit and development of the dairy business in our district.

The committee on markets and trade brands will exert its influence to bring all the dairy products to the people. It will, rapidly as our canneries, private dairies, and cream factories develop, try to establish or help establish Klamath brands of dairy products and put them on the market in name and package such as will help to establish the Klamath district second name. The committee hopes to help people in the towns of the county to get the best, wholesome, certified milk and dairy products obtainable anywhere.

The committee on dairy implements, machinery and exhibits should bring to us types of the best available, in use in the large or small dairy or cheese factories. Jobbers in these articles should not hesitate to put their wares in the district on commission or otherwise. The development of the dairy industry in the Middle West has been helped significantly by the campaign of education carried on by dealers and commission men.

The committee on food for dairy animals has an interesting series of duties to work upon. The introduction of soiling crops, of good balanced food which can be raised here, of new varieties, such as field peas, vetch, etc., of special process mills for making such products as alfalfa meal, the introduction of the silo if necessary, and many more lines of work which in no wise need to await the coming of the dairy herd.

It is of course not necessary now to dilate upon the value of the dairy industry for this section of the state. Something will be said regarding this matter later. The present great need is to give the subject individual attention. Study the question, read dairy papers, get informed. The people of Iowa and Wisconsin and Minnesota didn't import milkers. They learned to milk, and they learned how to conserve the business, and

If anyone does not believe that the railroad is coming, they should have been in the vicinity of Ady yesterday. A large crew was started to work Saturday evening and worked all night and all day Sunday, and today the track is completed from the present terminus across the channel and the gang is now continuing laying track across the marsh.

The Southern Pacific evidently did not want any interference in its work, so threw on a big force of men so as to complete the track across the channel during Sunday. The piles were driven and a bridge across the water constructed and the track laid in twenty-four hours. The officials of the road have made no statement as to their orders or plans, but as the track laying crew is today proceeding with the work, it is evident that the intention is to rush the completion of the road to Klamath Falls, as announced several months ago.

The announcement was made that the road would be ready for operation by May, and it is now probable that the track will be completed before that time, although the inauguration of the service may not take place until the early part of May.

In ten days the work trains will have crossed the marsh and will be seen coming up the valley, and it is quite likely that then some of the people will wake up to the fact that the railroad is coming. The special crew of 100 men that was working yesterday has been taken off and the regular track laying gang will continue the work.

ARRESTED FOR SELLING WHISKEY

The complaint was sworn to by a man by the name of Martin, who says the whiskey was sold in one of the bedrooms in the Wilson lodging house by Seeds. A quart bottle was bought for \$2 by another man and Martin was given a drink. Bail was placed at \$250 and Seeds will be given a hearing on Wednesday.

HOT SPRINGS CASE FINALLY DISMISSED

A telegram was received today by A. H. Naftzger, president of the Hot Springs Improvement Company, informing him that the case of Von L. Meyer has been dismissed by the United States Circuit Court. This case involved the title to the tract of land now owned in this city by the Hot Springs Company and has been in the courts for a long time. This decision permanently settles the question of title to this valuable land and brings to an end litigation that has cost thousands of dollars in attorneys' fees and court costs.

BOUND OVER ON FORGERY CHARGE

The preliminary hearing of Henry Morrell, charged with passing a forged check on W. E. Seemore of the American House, was held today before Judge Miller. The check was signed with the name of Stella Watson. Morrell was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Schallock in Dorris Saturday and returned to this city yesterday. He was bound over to await the action of the Grand Jury at the June term of court.

O. B. Gates, member of the public improvement committee of the Chamber of Commerce, is today circulating a petition to Chief Construction Engineer H. P. Hoey to be forwarded to Chief Hood, urging that in the plans for a depot at Klamath Falls the construction department give us as creditable a building as possible. SHOULD GET READY FOR CELEBRATION

STREETS AND YARDS OF THE CITY NEED A GENERAL CLEANING UP.

Now that it is assured that the railroad will reach Klamath Falls by the first of May, it is time the railroad celebration committee get busy. Members of the committee state that they already have plans for the celebration mapped out, and that just as soon as they can get a definite statement from the officials, the date for the celebration will be set and invitations sent out. The Governors of Oregon and California will be invited, and Senators Bourne and Chamberlain and Congressman Lawley, and a number of other reclamation and government officials. His exclusion, however, will not be a disadvantage, for, as the people of Klamath Falls are organizing this event for one week, a large delegation is also expected from Lake County.

There is one thing that the people of Klamath Falls should do in preparation of this event. The streets should be cleaned, lawns and private property should be beautified by the removal of refuse; trees should be trimmed, and, in fact, the city should have a general cleaning up so that it will present an attractive appearance to the crowds of visitors expected. It would be well if a general "clean up" day were decided upon, when every property owner and business man in the city would take a day off and join in a cleaning up crusade.

There will be many strangers who will visit this city for the first time during the railroad celebration, and if they are favorably impressed with the looks of the city, they are likely to remain. It is an opportunity of a life-time for the people of this city and they should take advantage of it. There is work for the city officials, and there is work for everyone in preparing the city for the reception of its visitors. The time is short and work should commence at once. The stores and buildings will be expected to decorate, and they should attend to securing their hanging and flags before the supply is exhausted. If orders are placed now, the merchants will be able to replenish their stock if necessary in time for the celebration.
