Houston Also Purchases An Improved Exhibition Model Edison Kinetoscope and Double Revolving Stereopticon Machine.

Manager Houston of the Opera House says that he was only partly successful on his recent trip in bringing good attractions for Klamath County. He made a contract with the Northwestern Theatrical Association of Seattle, one of the best concerns on the Coast, for two weeks, commencing May 1st. Klamath Falls will thus be able to see some good shows, but it will not get the best until the railroad is fully established, and that will be too late for this year's bill.

Mr. Houston has arranged with the Regardes Bros. Company to return here sometime in June. This is one of the best companies that has ever been in this city. BECOMING A FRUIT COUNTRY

THOUSANDS OF TREES HAVE BEEN PLANTED IN THE KLAMATH BASIN.

It is maintained that this valley will rival Wenatchee, Washington, or Hood River for the quality of fruit grown.

Thousands of fruit trees have been set out in the Klamath Basin this spring. Those who have particularly studied the subject and paid the closest attention to the old orchards maintain that this valley will rival Wenatchee, Washington, or Hood River for quality of its fruit. W. E. Bowdoin is this week having an orchard set out on a five-acre tract of land which he regards as being very favorably located. It is about two miles southeast of town on the Enterprise tract and is protected hill land.

Medford's Chief Engineer reports preparations now being made for laying during the present season about 14 miles of cement sidewalk, and it has been decided to add at least 20 blocks to the present paved district, aside from completing the work in the business district. With a tremendous fruit crop setting, a busy season is on for the Medford district.

Oregon's last Legislature did not give a penny to the improvement of the roads of this state, and that lack just puts the commonwealth two years further behind and puts a corresponding setback in the automobile industry of the state. The motorists of Portland hope to be organized sufficiently to get something from the next Legislature, and to that end an Oregon State Automobile Association is planned, to which it is hoped to have all the owners in the state belong, for the sum of \$2 initiation fee and 25 cents a month dues.

LAYING RAILS ACROSS MARSH

STEEL GANG HAS BEEN RUSHING THE WORK SINCE LAST SUNDAY.

Reported That Track Will Be Continued to Upper Lake at Once to Connect With Saw Mill and Box Factory to Handle Freight.

The steel gang has been busy since Sunday laying track across the marsh, and it is expected that they will reach Midland within a week. From Midland to Klamath Falls, it is stated, the road bed has been leveled and is ready for ties and rails, so it is only a matter of a short time when the track will be completed.

The grade has been completed for some time from the upper lake to the railroad yards in this city, and it is reported that the track laying crew will continue on to the lake and that the spur will be put in to connect with the Long Lake mill and the box factory. No definite announcement has yet been made as to the date of beginning service on the road, but from present indications the track should be completed before the first of May, and undoubtedly trains will be running into Klamath Falls by the middle of the month.

Lone Pine Institute

The local institute at Lone Pine schoolhouse was in every way successful and instructive as well as enjoyable. A large number of the patrons of the school as well as the citizens of the surrounding country came with well-filled baskets, and when the noon hour came spread a banquet that would delight the most exacting epicure. The hens laid many colored eggs and then yielded up their lives for the occasion.

The meeting was held in the new schoolhouse in that district. This is a building of which the people may well be proud. It furnishes an object of what rural communities in Klamath county may do. The building is neat in design and construction and well lighted. It has what is often neglected in such buildings—a ventilating system. The interior is ceiled and painted a light tan color, which is pleasing and easy on the eyes. The windows are provided with an adjustable shade, which is a decided improvement over the ordinary roller shade for schools.

The grounds are well fenced and about forty trees have been set out. The yard will be leveled and sown to blue grass. In a few years the grove will be a thing of much value to the neighborhood. They have a deep well provided with a good pump, and in addition to the wood shed have constructed a commodious horse shed for the accommodation of pupils who come some distance. The government ditch will furnish water to that section of the valley this year and the land is being cleared and prepared for water. With the fine new school house and the land under irrigation, this district presents a prosperous and attractive appearance to the homeseeker.

BENEFITS OF CELEBRATION

Of more Than Local Interest—Concerns Every Manufacturer, Jobber and Wholesale Dealer On Pacific Coast, Also Homeseekers.

In discussing the proposed celebration, Frank Ira White said: "Celebration of completion of the railroad to Klamath Falls is not simply of local interest. It concerns every manufacturer, jobber and wholesale dealer of the Pacific Coast, and thousands of men seeking homes on the land, but who have hesitated to come here until the boon of modern transportation facilities should be an accomplished fact. It will date the establishment of the Klamath Falls gateway for commerce of Southeastern Oregon, and should be made an event that will illumine the history of the development of this rich region."

Capt. O. C. Applegate says: "The coming of the railroad inaugurates an era of extensive development in a region here large enough for a state, heretofore isolated, but which abounds in great natural resources. In fact, I think that some of us who have been here for thirty or forty years do not begin to realize what can be accomplished through intensive farming and by the introduction of numerous industries and the prosecution of them by modern methods."

"As an intelligent and patriotic people, then, who are actually able to conceive of the great change now at hand, we ought to pull ourselves together and go to the limit in celebrating this extraordinary event. Everybody ought to be here, with his wife and child and all the neighbors to welcome the coming of the iron horse. I am not sure that we ought to ignore the original Americans in this matter, and, as the old wild regime is to give way to a new era of development and civilization, receive the iron horse with the war whoop, or in some other way, let Brother Lo join with us in the glad hurrah."
