

ANOTHER SAW MILL FOR BOXES

Harvey & Adams, of Grants Pass, Will Build Near Keno

Harvey & Adams of Grants Pass have secured a location and will erect a 25,000 capacity saw mill below Keno. The new mill will be located on the property of R. W. Tower at the mouth of Bear Valley about one mile from the railroad. The location is below Keno and about a mile and a quarter from the Downing ranch. A spur will be put in by the railroad to haul out the manufactured product.

Messrs. Harvey and Adams are practical saw millmen, and have secured 8,000,000 feet of standing timber to begin business on. They have a contract for box material, and most of their output will be shipped to California. With all of the commons going into boxes, this will leave them the better grades for the local market.

This will make the third mill in Klamath county which will saw box material, and it is predicted that within a few years Klamath county will be furnishing the greater portion of the boxes for the fruit sections of California. It is quite probable that there will be a number of other saw mills built in the timber near Keno within the next two years. There are large bodies of timber in that section which are easily accessible in case a branch is extended to connect with the railroad.

SUIT DISMISSED.

The injunction proceedings instituted Tuesday by Abel Ady against Leo Robinson, in which a temporary restraining order was issued, was settled Thursday, Judge Noland signing the order dismissing the suit last evening. The order was asked for by R. S. Smith, Mr. Ady's attorney, for the purpose of preventing Mr. Robinson from consuming the title of certain property, alleging that such sale was in contravention of certain agreements existing between them. The order dismissing the proceedings settles the matter. Mr. Robinson was represented by G. F. Stone.

Will Choose Plans For School Building

The directors of School District No. 1 will meet tonight for the purpose of accepting plans for the new school building and deciding on the estimates necessary to construct such a building. As soon as the plans are accepted a special election will be held for the purpose of voting bonds for the building.

The proposed building will contain eight rooms and will probably be constructed of wood with a stone or cement foundation. The location of the new building, in case the bonds are voted, has not been selected yet, although the board has several locations in view. This matter will be left to a vote of the people at the time the vote is taken on the bonds.

Dozen Eggs a Day For Three Weeks

County Judge Griffith and the Commissioners have been gathering statistics today on the number of eggs a man can eat a day and for how long he can keep it up. Among the bills presented at this term were those contracted for during the recent quarantine on a number of small pox cases in the county. It appears that something like 75 dozen eggs were consumed by the attendants. This would be 12 eggs per day for each man for a period of over three weeks. A reasonable variety and quantity of other food was also eaten.

THOSE WHO FIRED MOST OF IT WERE THE VERY INDIVIDUALS WHO WOULD BE MOST BENEFITED. WHEN THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE UNDERTOOK TO HANDLE THE RAILROAD DAY PROGRAM IT WAS SUGGESTED THAT IT HAVE INCLUDED IN IT THE PUBLICITY FUND AND THE SEATTLE FAIR AND SUCH OTHER PROJECTS AS MAY COME UP DURING THE YEAR. THE MARK WAS SET AT \$5000, ONE-FIFTH OF WHICH WOULD HAVE BEEN CONTRIBUTED BY THE HOT SPRINGS IMPROVEMENT COMPANY.

HERETOFORE IT HAS BEEN THE CUSTOM TO TAKE UP A SUBSCRIPTION FOR EVERYTHING THAT CAME AROUND. WHAT HAS BEEN THE RESULT? THE BUSINESS MEN OF THIS CITY HAVE BEEN CONTRIBUTING FAR MORE THAN \$5000 A YEAR, WITH VERY POOR RESULTS. NOW IT IS PROPOSED TO PLACE ALL OF THIS IN THE HANDS OF A RESPONSIBLE ORGANIZATION AND HOLD IT ACCOUNTABLE FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF THE FUNDS. WHAT WAS THE RESULT, THEN? WHEN A COMMITTEE OF BUSINESS MEN TOOK THE SUBSCRIPTION CONTRACTS AROUND THEY WERE GIVEN A MOST DISCOURTEOUS RECEIPT, TO USE MILD LANGUAGE. THE MORE SO FROM THOSE WHO WOULD BE BENEFITED THE MOST. AS IN ALL OTHER MATTERS THERE WAS A LIMIT, AND THAT HAS BEEN REACHED. NOW THE CHAMBER PASSES IT UP TO THE BUSINESS MEN OF THIS CITY, AND IF THEY DO NOT THINK ENOUGH OF THEIR OWN WELFARE TO TAKE HOLD OF THE MATTER, THEN THE CHAMBER WILL LET IT FALL.

IF THIS IS DONE, THEN WE WILL GO AHEAD LIKE PORTLAND, EUGENE, MEDFORD AND OTHER OREGON CITIES WHOSE BUSINESS MEN HAVE GOTTEN THEIR SHOULDERS BACK OF THE WHEEL OF PROGRESS AND SPUN IT AHEAD. FOR THE FAIR NAME OF THIS CITY, FOR ITS FUTURE WELFARE AND PROSPERITY, FOR THE GOOD OF FUTURE GENERATIONS, LET US DO OUR DUTY AND DO IT RIGHT. NOT ONLY LET US HAVE A RAILROAD DAY, BUT LET US HAVE A PUBLICITY FUND THAT WILL BE A CREDIT TO YOU AND TO KLAMATH FALLS.

Would Have Yearly Session Legislature

ALBANY, Or., May 6.—The coming session of the state senate will consider the proposed plan of holding annual sessions of the Oregon legis-

lature, one session to be devoted exclusively to the introduction of bills, and the next session to the passage or rejection of the bills formerly introduced, no new measures to be presented except under an emergency.

At a meeting of Linn council of the grange at Lyons, a committee, consisting of C. L. Shaw, Eugene Palmer and A. C. Miller, was named to prepare resolutions embodying this plan and to present them to the state grange. If the plan is approved by the state organization, an effort will be made to enact it into law by the initiative route.

This same committee was also instructed at the meeting to prepare resolutions for presentation to the state grange, recommending a uniform passenger rate on all railroads doing business in Oregon. There are some lines, it is stated, that still maintain the old fare of 4 cents per mile, and legislation is desired which will force all roads to observe the 3-cent rate.

The Linn county council went on record in favor of the submission of the state normal school question to the people in the 1910 election by means of the initiative, and thus settle the matter permanently.

There was a spirited debate at the council on the subject of an initiative measure to secure statewide prohibition in 1910, but no action was taken. It is said that this question will come up in the session of the state grange this spring.

Meeting of Directors

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce held their regular meeting last night. It was decided to call a mass meeting of the citizens at the Court House tonight to decide whether or not to hold a Railroad Day celebration.

The matter of the Odessa mail service was also taken up and the secretary instructed to write the Postoffice Department and our Senators and Congressmen, asking the latter to use their endeavors to have a daily mail service established between Klamath Falls and Odessa. It is believed that as soon as the conditions are known that the request will be granted by the Department.

It was decided that in case a celebration was held that it be on June 2d. The reason for the change in date was on account of the opening of the Rose Festival in Portland on June 7th, and also on account of other conventions to be held in Portland, which might prevent some from coming on the excursion.

A request has been made to the Postmaster General to have this service made permanent, and it is expected that an order to do so will be issued before the first of June, the time when the service was to have been inaugurated from Astoria.
