Edison D. Fuller, known to his playmates as "Babe," who lives at Columbia, a suburb of Seattle, is believed to be the largest boy for his age in the Northwest, being 10 1/2 years old and weighing 200 pounds. He is five feet, three inches high and has the strength of an ordinary man. Contrary to the general belief, he is not fat; his flesh is solid, and he handles his huge frame with considerable agility. In a tug-of-war contest with five playmates the other day he was the victor. "Babe" can lift 350 pounds, and has often picked up a sack weighing 150 pounds and carried it from the house to the barn. Physicians declare the boy is as fully developed as a man in the prime of life, but beyond this he is normal in energy. "Babe" has a brother who is six feet, 1 1/2 inches in his stocking feet and weighs 225 pounds. Mr. Fuller appears small beside his son, weighing but 170 pounds. The boy's mother weighs 170 pounds.

Strong Rooms.
The Bank of England's strong room is one of the largest in the world. The foundation, sixty-six feet below the street level, is a bed of concrete twenty feet deep. Above this is a lake seven feet deep, and above that thick plates of iron specially manufactured to resist both skill and force. Any one attempting an entrance from above would find a similar bed of concrete, a similar lake and similar plates of iron. The walls are impenetrable, while the doors are one foot thick, weigh four tons each and are made absolutely undrillable. The Imperial Ottoman bank, Constantinople, had a marvelous steel fort built upon a water bearing rock, and on top of the rock foundation is a four foot bed of concrete. The height is over thirty-six feet, length forty-six feet and width twenty-four. The steel walls are surrounded by masonry and concrete six feet thick throughout, while the whole comprises nearly thirty tons of steel.

Circulation of the Blood.
The idea of some sort of movement of the blood in man and the lower animals was possessed by Aristotle and other Greeks and by the physicians of the Alexandrian school as well as by the doctors and surgeons of the middle ages. In fact, even the village barbers knew of such movement. But no one, not even the wisest of men, had any conception of a continuous stream returning to its source—a circulation in the true sense of the word—or of the functions of the heart as the motor power of the movement of the blood until it was demonstrated by Harvey in 1628.

The "Letters of Junius"
The vexed question of the real authorship of the "Letters of Junius" has never been positively settled. Mr. Chebet's learned work to show that Sir Philip Francis was the author of the famous letters, while a strong production, falls of absolute proof. The attempt was made to prove that Thomas Paine wrote the letters, but that, too, failed to convince. The question is still a mystery, though the balance of the evidence is in favor of Sir Philip Francis.
