Countries Ruled by Monarchs Some People Think Are Usurpers.
 The German emperor, whose occupation of the German throne is said to have been the outcome of a "good commercial speculation," is thought by many to be heir to the throne of England, he being the eldest child of the eldest child of the late Queen Victoria.

A MAYOR'S NOVEL IDEA.

Scheme to Promote the Building of Cement Sidewalks.


