SPECIAL SEWER BOND ELECTION ON WEDNESDAY

Election Will Decide Whether Klamath Falls Will Take Its Place Among the Progressive Cities of State

A special election will be held on Wednesday for the purpose of voting on bonding the city for \$45,000 with which to build a main sewer system. The qualifications of voters as provided by the city charter is as follows:

No person shall be entitled to vote at any general or special election in the city who is not a qualified elector of the State of Oregon, who has not been a resident of the city of Klamath Falls for six months next preceding such election, and who has not been a resident of the ward in which he applies to vote for sixty days next preceding such election, who has not been registered as elector as provided in this act, nor at any special election for the purpose of issuing bonds of the town, unless he shall at the time of voting be the owner of real estate within the limits of the city, which will be affected by such proposed bond, and upon which he actually pays a tax, and which property was assessed on the last assessment roll under the name of such voter or his grantor.

It is probable that the people of Klamath Falls realize the great necessity and importance of voting the sewer bonds, yet there is grave danger of the defeat of these bonds in account of the inactivity of the voters who are strongly in favor of a sewer system. It is absolutely necessary for every property owner, who is in favor of a sewer, to go to the polls on Wednesday and vote. It will be too late to do anything after the election is over. On the result of the election on Wednesday will depend the future of the city. It will decide the question whether the city will build up and prosper and grow, or whether progress will be retarded. Every voter should remember that with first-class sanitary conditions, fifty per cent will be added to the valuation of the property of the city.

OPENING DATE IN SEPTEMBER

Plans Complete For Drawing of Lands in Lake County

A bulletin has just been issued by the Oregon Valley Land Company, announcing September 9, 1909, as the opening date of the 300,000 acres of land comprising a part of the old Oregon military land grant in southern Lake, Harney and Klamath counties. The distribution will begin on that date and continue from day to day till all the tracts are disposed of, according to the plans set out in the company's literature.

The tract was a part of the old Oregon military land grant and was sold a year ago by the Hunter land company to the Oregon Home Valley Land company. It was then cut up by this company into 12,000 lots laid out in Lakeview, the county seat of Lake County.

It has been but nine months since the sale of these tracts was commenced by this company, and in that time the entire tract has been disposed of in 22 states. But 1000 tracts were sold on the Pacific Coast, the remainder of the 300,000 acres being sold to eastern people, the larger part of whom will come to Oregon to settle and farm their new holdings.

BARBERS WILL ENFORCE SUNDAY CLOSING LAW

Secretary and Treasurer of State Board Inspect Shops of This City—Swansen Appointed Deputy of this District

F. M. Leabe and R. R. Wallace, secretary and treasurer of the State Board of Barber Examiners, were in the city over Sunday from Portland, making an examination of the barber shops of this city. Before leaving on the boat this morning an examination was given to C. H. Ennis of Merrill and J. S. Eapy of Dorris.

Secretary Leabe complimented the barbers of this city on the excellent sanitary conditions of the shops and the up-to-date arrangements of the accommodations. J. E. Swansen of the Klamath at op was appointed a deputy for Lake and Klamath counties, and will probably conduct any examinations that may be necessary.

The visiting members of the State Board issued instructions for the strict enforcement of the Sunday closing law in the towns of this and Lake counties, and also for the enforcement of the sanitary regulations. The shops of this city all close on Sunday, but it is reported that this is not always the case with the shops at Merrill, Bonanza and some of the towns in Lake county. The Sunday closing regulation is a state law, and hereafter any infringement will be reported to the District Attorney for prosecution.

Redmen Meet Defeat In Both Games

While the weather was not very favorable for ball playing yesterday, yet a good-sized crowd witnessed the game between the Klamath Falls team and the Redmen, which resulted in a victory for the former with the score 16 to 8. The game was umpired by T. W. Zimmerman, and his decisions met with the approval of the spectators, although some of the Redmen claim that they did not get a fair deal. The game was a little slow on both sides.

This makes the second game lost by the Redmen, that team having been defeated by the High School on Saturday by a score of 2 to 1.

National Teachers Association Meet

The executive committee of the National Educational Association announces the selection of Denver as the place of meeting for the forty-seventh annual convention, July 5 to 9, 1909.

The railway lines have made reduced round-trip fares which will be in effect on July 1. The tickets will carry a going limit of ten days from date of sale, with final return limit of October 31, and include stop-over privileges in both directions within those limits. The fare from Ashland, both ways via Portland, will be \$65.30.

As all the lines in Colorado and surrounding states have agreed to grant a rate of one fare for the round trip following the convention, to all points in Colorado, it is probable that many others, besides the teachers, will take advantage of the low rates.

NEW SCALP BOUNTY LAW

Will Go Into Effect the Twenty-third of This Month

The new scalp bounty law, which was passed by the last legislature, will go into effect on May 23. The bounty that will be paid is as follows: For coyote or coyote pup, \$1.50; gray or black wolf, \$5; gray or black wolf pup, timber wolf or pup, \$2.50; bob cat, wild cat or lynx, \$2; mountain lion, panther or cougar, \$10.

The entire skin of each of said animals must be presented to the County Clerk within six months from the date of killing the animal. The skin includes and must have attached thereto all four of the jaws or feet, the tail and the skin of the entire head, including both ears thereof, eye loles and skin to the tip of the nose. The skin will be examined by the clerk, who shall mark it by cutting off the scalp of certain animals and the fore foot of others.
