THE POULTRY YARD.

[From June Farm Journal.]
The house is a night hawk.
Rush the broilers along. The
quicker you can get them on the mar-
ket the better for you.

What is prettier than a bunch of
thrifty chicks, all of one color and
breed, and as much alike as so many
peas?

As every chick hatched carries the
blood of the male, it is important
that great care be taken in selecting
the head of the flock.

Hens feel the warm weather as
much as other folks. Give them a
shady place to sit down once in a
while and rest. They will do all the
better for it.

Some folks think that hens do not
need oyster shells when they can run
out. Just try giving them some and
see how that is. You will be wiser
after that.

My method for keeping lice from
troubling poultry at night is to sus-
pend the roosting poles by wires
from the rafters of the house. If
the poles are smooth the lice will
not remain on them if they are there
at all.

Turkey hens are profitable until
five years old, but it is a good plan to
change the gobblers every year. It
requires twenty-eight days to hatch
a turkey egg, and seven eggs are con-
sidered a setting. The nests should
be on the ground.

A foul house should not be a foul
house. Wash up and clean up. Lice

stay on the birds except when hunt-
ing for blood.

of careful feeding and housing is
young stock ready for market while
prices are good. Fowls intended for
early market should be kept in close
quarters, just light enough so they
can see to eat. For a fattening ra-
tion we like cornmeal and ground
oats best.

Largest Family on Record.
In the Huronian manuscript Nos. 78
and 90, in the library of the British
museum mention is made of the most
extraordinary family that has ever
been known in the world's history.
The parties were a Scotch weaver and
his wife (not wives), who were the
father and mother of sixty-two chil-
dren. The majority of the offspring
of this prolific pair were boys—exactly
how many is not known, for the rec-
ord mentions the fact that forty-six of
the male children lived to reach man-
hood's estate and only four of the
daughters lived to be grown-up women.
Thirty-nine of the sons were still
living in the year 1820, the majority
of them then residing in and about
Newcastle-on-Tyne. It is recorded in
one of the old histories of Newcastle
that "a certain gentleman of large es-
tates" rode "thirty and three miles
beyond the Tyne to prove this won-
derful story." It is further related
that Sir J. Bowers adopted ten of the
sons and three other "hand-picked
men" took ten each. The remaining
members of the extraordinary family
were brought up by the parents.

Mascagni's Royal Critic.
Mascagni, the famous composer,
was once asked to entertain the royal
court in Rome. He did so and de-
lighted his audience. When he finished
playing he started a conversation with
a little princess who had stood near
the piano during the recital and had
shown every sign of deep interest. As
a matter of fact, she had been in-
structed by her mother to say, if any
question should be asked, that "Mas-
cagni was the greatest musician in
Italy."

The composer asked her which of
the great living masters she liked best
and the proud mother turned toward
the child to hear the pretty little
speech which had been taught her.
Instead of the compliment came the
withering remark:

"There are no great masters living.
They are all dead."

The musician gave a little start and
then said:

"Your excellency permit me to con-
gratulate you. You are the most truth-
ful critic in Europe."

Queer Cases of Jilt.

one of his fictitious villains. She de-
