MONEY IN VETCH.

C. C. Brower, who recently returned from Albany, states that he spent about a week in the valley near Albany investigating the crops grown in that section. The farmers are planting a great deal of vetch and it has been a decided success. Experiments made by the Agricultural College at Corvallis have been a great help to the land owners. The land planted to vetch, when properly cared for, will bring a return profit on an average of \$60 an acre. Tests made have shown that Klamath county is particularly favorable to the growth of this crop.
