and electric mains, poles, real estate, hydrants, all physical properties, water rights, franchises and contracts and going values.
4. The fees to be paid the third arbitrator and the general expense of the board of arbitrators shall be borne equally by the companies and the city. The fees paid to the other arbitrators shall be paid by the parties choosing and engaging them.
Fourth—We submitted the following reduced rates to them for commercial lighting, which they refused to accept:
For Tungsten Lamps
Business—1-300 c. p. 4c; 300-400 c. p. 2 1/2c; 400-500 c. p. 3c; 500 and over, 3 1/2c. Residence—1-100 c. p. 3c; 100-200 c. p. 2 1/2c; 200 and over, 2c.
Now, because we cannot see our way clear to cutting our commercial rates upon the carbon lamps the Mayor refuses to sign this ordinance which the Council has passed.
We are exceedingly sorry that this is as it is, as we now have unloaded at the depot a car of four-inch and larger pipe for extension of mains. We have one car on route from the East which, unfortunately, is shipped and so too late to countermand the order. We had two cars loaded and en route from Seattle, but caught them by wire and stopped their shipment here. We practically had the contract let for the construction of an additional reservoir above the present original one, and the laying of 9,000 feet of four-inch and larger pipe to connect it with the system, besides the material ordered and partly shipped for the construction of the above mentioned reservoir contract and all the pipe the full length of Klamath avenue and four blocks south on Sixth street from Klamath.
This will also work a great hardship upon the town, its merchants, contractors, real estate men, carpenters, mechanics, etc., as we will be unable to make water or electric connections to any of the numerous new houses now being built or contemplated.

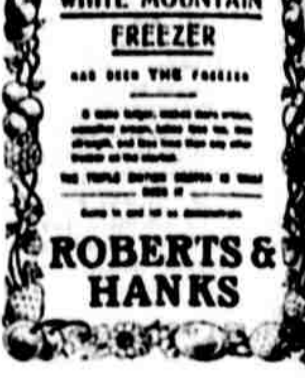
