Citizens and Business Men Putting Forth

EVERY LAUNCH WILL DECORATE

Excursion and Other Means of Enter-
tainment Will Make a Lively
Day for All

The citizens and business men here are getting busy to-day preparing for the Railroad Day celebration. To-day was the official clean-up day, as called by Mayor Henderson and the merchants took occasion to get their shops up their store fronts, and every nearly all of the old houses and buildings have been cleaned. On account of so many improvements and preparations for building going on, the streets will not give the best of appearance but Marshall Carter is doing his best and wherever it is possible he is insisting on all obstructions being removed and the streets and walks cleaned.

Many of the business houses are already receiving their decorations and flags and bunting are in evidence. Many of the merchants have also completed their floats for the parade and others are hard at work preparing theirs. The parade on Railroad Day will be the biggest ever seen in this city, and the citizens are entering into the plans with a degree of enthusiasm which is bound to make it a big success.

It is stated that every launch boat and water craft on the lower lake will be in commission for the water carnival. Those who cannot use their boats are loaning them, and every one is taking advantage of the free flags, bunting and lanterns which are being furnished for use in decorating the boats and floats. Many barges and floats are being built to use as trailers on the launchways, and the big water parade will present a grand appearance at night.

The big celebration will, in reality, commence on Sunday, as that is the time the Klamath Falls Military Band will give their excursion to the Upper Lake and Odessa. There are already a large number of strangers in the city who arrived ahead of the excursion. 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SOUTHERN CATTLE COMING NORTH

California Stockmen Take Advantage
of Demand in Portland—A New
Market for Klamath.

Since April 1 there has passed through Gazelle from California points to Portland and Tacoma, 9,000 head of beef cattle. The shipment the first of April was light, only reaching about forty cars, but during the five weeks previous to June 1 there were 309 cars shipped north. Most of these cattle are unloaded and fed at Gazelle.

The price received for the beef was between 4 and 4½ cents, or an average of 4½ a head. In past years very little beef was shipped from California to the northern markets, but the establishment of the packing houses in Portland has created a new market. Nearly all of Klamath county cattle have been shipped to California, but it is predicted that in the future the Portland markets will compete for the cattle business of this section, with the result that better prices can be secured by the cattle growers.

BARLEY IS GIVEN ONLY EIGHT YEARS.

William Barkley was sentenced to eight years imprisonment in the Federal prison on McNeill's Island; also to pay a fine of \$1 and the costs of the proceeding against him where he was charged with the murder of Sid Jacobs. It was expected that Barkley would be given the limit of ten years for the crime of which he pleaded guilty—that of manslaughter—but the United States District Attorney did not attempt to make a strong case.

Speaking in behalf of the defendant, Judge McGinn stated that the murder had been committed when both were under the influence of liquor and in a lonely spot where there were no witnesses to the deed. The attorney was of the opinion that Barkley's plea that he had acted in self-defense, particularly as Jacobs had no right on the reservation, should be taken into consideration in pronouncing sentence.

MEANS OPENING VALUABLE TRACTS

All Land Suitable for Farms Will Be
Turned Back Into the Public
Domain for Entry.

The following letter has been received from Congressman W. C. Hawley relative to the progress of his efforts to have the agricultural lands in the forest reserves thrown open to the public:

Committee on Agriculture,
House of Representatives,
Washington, D. C.,
June 2, 1909.
Dear Sir:—Ever since I became a member of Congress I have been urging that all lands suitable for homesteads now included in the forest reserves should be returned to the public domain. I took the matter up again with the Secretary of Agriculture in a letter, a copy of his reply I enclose herewith. I shall urge that this survey be completed as soon as possible.

Dear Sir:—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of May 25th in relation to lands, probably agricultural in character, which have been included in national forests in the State of Oregon. I am now having a survey made of the forests with a view to ascertaining the facts in this very connection, and if we find that considerable areas have been included that are more suitable for farms, and are not water-sheds that should be reforested, the intention is to have them turned back to the public domain. I am going out myself this summer to the mountain States to inquire into this question. Very truly yours,
