#### SLAVERY ENERVATING TO SOIL.

This change is coming."

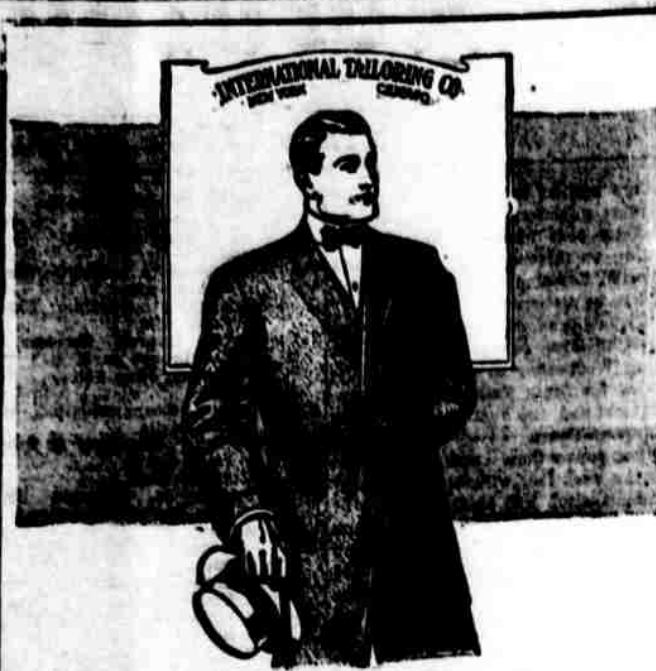
