India. Only about one-third of the land of India is under cultivation. A portion of the other two-thirds is taken up by rivers, lakes, woods, uncultivable hills or sandy or stony plain, towns, etc.

Old Time Dainties. Jackdaws, magpies, squirrels, hedgehogs, crabs, peewees and swains were popular dishes to the middle ages.

Elephant Tusks. An elephant tusk is hollow for about a third of its length, although the size of this hollow varies a good deal. It is called "the bamboo" in a dried tusk, and when borne proudly by the tusk it is filled with a jellylike substance.

Persian Newspapers. Persian newspapers are reproduced from handwriting by lithography, no types being used.

Costa Rica. Costa Rica means the rich coast, and in most respects it is rich, particularly in the snake family, the most deadly of which is the deadly cobra de sangre, or blood snake.

Australia. Australia has more unexplored area in proportion to the population than any other country.

The Doll in the Window. Travelers through Serbian villages often see dolls suspended in the windows of cottages. The dolls have nothing to do with child life, but signify that a marriageable daughter or a widow lives in the house.

Manitoba. Manitoba traces its origin from Manitou, the Indian appellation of "the Great Spirit."

Hot Milk For Bad Tempers. When it rains in the London zoo hot milk is fed to the lions, tigers and monkeys. It has been found that rain "gets on the nerves" of these animals and that the hot milk produces contentment and sleep.

Pearls. The perfectly round pearls are the most valuable. Next come the pear shaped and, lastly, the egg shaped.

Picked Tea. Natives of Burma and parts of India prepare tea in a peculiar way called "picking." The leaves are boiled and pressed into bamboo tubes, which are buried in the ground until the material has matured.

The Turkey. The turkey was first discovered in America and was transported to England in the early part of the sixteenth century. Since then it has been acclimated in nearly all parts of the world.

Cabbages. In the middle ages cabbages were so rare they had to be salted. A cabbage from Holland remained an expensive present into the sixteenth century, 30 English shillings being paid for six of these and a few carrots in 1595.

Alpine Glaciers. There are 250 glaciers in the Alps said to be over five miles in length.

Theatrical Censors. The censorship of the theater was brought about in England through the audacity of Fielding, who wrote a play which satirized Sir Robert Walpole, who was prime minister of England and who introduced the famous act of 1737 licensing the theater.

Glacier Streams. The water produced by the melting of glacier ice in summer flows down through crevasses to the bottom of the glacier and, forming a channel by erosion, emerges often as a large stream.

Dickens and His Bed. Charles Dickens refused to lie down unless his bed was placed due north and south. He gave notice of the rule before arriving at a friend's house or a hotel, but a compass was always handy in his baggage to make sure.

Long Friday. Good Friday was called "Long Friday" by the Saxons on account of the length of the office and fastings enjoined on this day.

Roman Warships. The men-of-war of the ancient Romans had a crew of about 225 men, of whom 174 were oarsmen working on three decks. The speed of these vessels was about 6 knots an hour in fair weather.

Stale Nuts. When nuts have become too dry to be good remove the shells, let stand overnight in equal parts of milk and water, then dry them in the oven and they will be fresh and good.

Servants. Servants retain many memories of Turkish rule. The women are kept in the background. The men marry for the qualities of the housewife rather than for romantic love. It is often that young men marry women much older than themselves.
