The first tests of the McClean-Litvak automatic gun, said to be the largest automatic gun in the world, have recently been made over Lake Erie near Cleveland. The gun has been contracted for by the British government for use in guarding the English Channel. It is mounted on an automobile truck, said to be capable of conveying a supply of ammunition and a crew of ten men at the rate of 25 miles an hour on ordinary roads, and of wheeling into position and shooting before ordinary artillery could be unlimbered. In the trials three-pound shells were thrown three and one-half miles at the rate of 250 per minute.

A German medical journal describes five recent cases of injury inflicted upon the eyes by the rays of mercury vapor lamps. These cases, in connection with others previously reported, leave no room for doubt that the light of the mercury vapor lamps employed in therapeutics and for the illumination of factories and other buildings may injure the eyes, not only by causing conjunctivitis (inflammation of the lining membrane of the eyeball), but also by producing paralysis of the retina.

The city of London has increased from an area of 0.3 square mile in the year 1200 to 117 square miles in 1908. At present the annual supply of water is about 82,125,000,000 gallons. Liverpool, which had an area of 0.1 square mile in the year 1300, covered 27.8 square miles in 1905. Its present population is 782,000, while the corporation water works provide a supply of 10,801,000,000 gallons to a population of 907,000 people.

### ATTRACTIONS AT THE A.-Y.-P. EXPOSITION.

A Hair-Raising Trip Through Air on a Tramway.

SEATTLE, June 29.—Standing side by side on a bit of track near the Machinery Hall of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition are two locomotives, one ten times the size of the other. The smaller one is the first ever used on a western railroad, the other is the largest locomotive in the world to-day.

With the smaller engine is connected an interesting history which covers the history of railroads of the West. It was built in 1861, and was first used on the St. Paul and Pacific Railroad in 1864. Out of this little system has grown the Great Northern.

It is a wood burner and weighs but twenty-five tons. It will haul one hundred tons of freight, or a weight equivalent to one standard Pullman car. This engine is said to be dear to the heart of J. J. Hill, the famous railroad president, and it has been used by him up to the present time to haul his private car.

The mammoth locomotive at the side of it weighs 251 tons, or over half a million pounds. It will haul a mile of loaded freight cars. It is of the Mallet type of compound articulating engine. This type is jointed, so that it can be operated on the curved tracks of a western railroad. The firebox is eight by ten and seven feet high—large enough to put the furniture of a room in. By a curious coincidence, the number of this engine on the Great Northern Railroad is "1909." That of the smaller one is "1."

The Aero Dive, the Plunge Through Space, or the Car of Flight, are names applied to the passenger-carrying tramway on the Pay Streak at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

Loaded with pleasure seekers, or more truthfully speaking, thrill-hunters, a car is hauled by cable to a dizzy height—some one has said 150 feet above the surface of Lake Union.

On reaching the top the car swings into space and is carried with the speed of a lightning express to the aerial station 200 feet over the lake. The return trip is made over a second cable, something after the fashion of which parcels are delivered from cashier to customer in dry goods stores.

It takes about three minutes to make the round trip, the car covering 400 feet while suspended to cables over Lake Union.

At Nome, Alaska, where the heavy surf makes dock building almost an impossibility, and where if wharves were built in the summer the winter ice floes would demolish them, aerial tramways are used to transport freight from steamship to shore.

So the thrilling tramway at the exposition is no more or less than a representation of just how cargoes are handled in the Far North, and the Aero Dive, as its builders choose to call it, is in fact a true scene of life at Nome.
