(Concluded From First Page.) for occupancy by the opening of the next school year, even if work were commenced on it at once. On account of the mix-up on the question of location it is difficult to state when work will be actually begun, or whether any effort will be made looking towards its early completion. There is a growing sentiment in favor of the location of the school in the vicinity of the Catholic church. At the present time fifty per cent of the school children come from that section of the city, and the taxpayers in that neighborhood declare that this is a sufficient argument in favor of locating the school in their midst. Property there is not nearly so high and the prospects for growth are as bright as any other portion of the city. While they are not making an active campaign for their section, they nevertheless feel that they are entitled to the school in view of the showing they are making.

CONGRESSMAN HAWLEY TO HAVE OPPOSITION.

Reported That W. K. Newell Will Be a Candidate. A Washington dispatch says: Wilbur K. Newell of Gaston, a prominent fruit expert, contemplates making the race against Hawley for congress next year. His campaign will probably be made in part on the proposition that Hawley followed Cannon in the house organization, thus aligning with the standpatters against those who sought reform of the government through the deposing of Cannon. Newell has been in Washington several days studying conditions. He hopes for strong support from the farming and temperance elements. W. K. Newell served two terms in the Oregon State Legislature—1905 and 1907—as a representative from Washington county, and made an excellent record. He is a ready debater, and was one of the recognized leaders of the house at each session. He has served for the past two years as president of the State Board of Horticulture, in which he has been an aggressive and able promoter of the fruit interests. He is a progressive orchardist and dairyman, having successfully combined these two industries on his extensive farm in Washington county. His lectures and addresses on dairying and fruit culture have been instructive and interesting features at many gatherings of farmers in the State.

PARTY BACK FROM VISIT TO CRATER LAKE BY AUTO.

An automobile party, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Howard and Mr. and Mrs. Nunn of Napa, Cal., returned Sunday from Crater Lake, the first auto to attempt the trip this year. The party had no difficulty in reaching Prospect with their machine, and took packhorses from there, being told the road was impassable. However, autos could have made the trip into the national park before encountering snow. There are some heavy drifts across the road, but the snow is disappearing fast, and Steel's camp can be made by auto within a couple of weeks. The trail from the rim to the lake cannot be used yet on account of the snow. It will be along in July before it will be safe to attempt the descent.—Medford Tribune.

WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS.

Too little attention is given to organizations of women. More and more every woman is being drawn into some sort of club or association, and as a result women are growing less morally and mentally near-sighted. The daily papers which lead us to believe that women foregather simply to wage a word war and display their military are misleading, for those who know can testify that such is not the case—the war and the military being only feminine characteristics of the most superficial sort and signifying no more than men's tobacco smoke. The women's organizations have done much in a moral and civic way, and their work is marching on. For instance, the American people possess Mount Vernon as a Mecca for patriotic pilgrims because of a devoted group of women, and they have to thank the Daughters of the American Revolution for most of our other historical landmarks. The buying in of Washington's headquarters at Valley Forge, which otherwise would have gone under the hammer, is inscribed as only one of their good works. They carry on a practical charity as well. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is one of the quietest but most efficient of women's organizations. What they do for erring girls—and to prevent young girls from treading the dark ways—is a beautiful story in itself, aside from their warfare against intemperance, their work in the jails, etc. The United Daughters of the Confederacy have largely been the cause of the union, now so strongly cemented, between the North and the South. If "the women of the South made the war," as they have been accused of doing, then have they bound up the wounds they caused.
