RAILROAD'S DISTRESS

N. C. O. APPEALING TO WESTERN
PACIFIC FOR ASSISTANCE

NONE WILL BE EXTENDED IT

Hill Is Being Forced South By the
Portland Papers—May Be the
Dream of Reporters.

The latest railroad report to come
 in is the frantic effort that is being
 made by the N. C. & O. to make some
 sort of traffic arrangements with the
 Western Pacific. It was reported at
 one time that Hill owned this line
 and at another that Gould had ac-
 quired it. Neither of these seem to
 be correct from the latest story.
 Some time ago the Western Pacific
 went to the N. C. & O. people and
 asked for traffic arrangements. That
 was before the change of freight and
 passenger business to this city, and
 inasmuch as this little line thought
 it had a monopoly that it could not
 lose, it refused to have anything to
 do with the Gould line. Now, how-
 ever, there is a different story. They
 have changed their tune and are
 tearfully appealing to it for help.
 Their appeal is falling on deaf ears,
 for the Western Pacific will have
 none of it. This same story has it
 that Hill and Gould have made a se-
 cret agreement to help each other
 out, to the end that Gould will get
 into Portland and Seattle and Hill
 will get into 'Frisco, both giants
 uniting their forces against their
 common enemy. It is the result of
 this agreement that causes the turn-
 down of the N. C. & O. Under pre-
 sent conditions it would seem that it
 is only a matter of time before there
 will be a need for a receiver.

If the stories coming from Port-
 land are true, then J. J. Hill is still
 building his railroad through Cen-
 tral Oregon. The old saying of
 "where there is no such smoke,
 there must be some fire" would seem
 to apply to this case, unless the
 whole structure is founded on the
 vivid imagination of the Portland
 reporters. One suspicious plan has
 made its appearance, and that is the
 reported purchase by Hill of the old
 Medford and Crater Lake road. It
 is hard to see just where this line
 would benefit Hill if he wants to get
 to 'Frisco, as is reported. It begins
 and ends nowhere. Even if it were
 extended into Central Oregon, as its
 promoters allege it will be, there
 would be little advantage in it to
 Hill, for it is certain that he has no
 desire to get into the Coos Bay coun-
 try. There is nothing for him to
 gain by just coming into Oregon and
 stopping there. If he starts south he
 will not stop until he reaches 'Frisco.

CAPITAL LARGELY INCREASED

Holgate Will Make This City His
Home, Change Being Necessary
Because of Official Position.

The Bank of Bonanza has in-
 creased its capital stock from \$10,-
 000 to \$20,000, its largely increasing
 business making possible the profit-
 able employment of a greater capital.
 By thus increasing its resources, the
 bank will be able to lend still further
 assistance to the farmers and stock-
 men of the eastern section of the
 county. The bank has a model bank
 building and equipment, and enjoys
 the exclusive patronage of an ex-

New officers will hereafter man-
 age the affairs of the bank. President
 Alex Martin Jr.'s time is fully oc-
 cupied in the management of the Klam-
 ath County Bank, which has a branch
 at Merrill, and H. L. Holgate, cash-

 as a member of the State Board of
 Control. The new officers are: Di-
 rectors, D. G. Horn, Jacob Rueck and
 Wm. C. Dalton; president, D. G.
 Horn; vice-president, Jacob Rueck;
 cashier, John Horn. The latter has
 been assistant cashier of the bank
 for some time.

Mr. Holgate will remove from Bo-
 nanza to this city, where he will re-
 side permanently. The cause of the
 change of residence is due to his of-
 ficial duties, which require that he
 be in closer touch with headquarters
 in Salem. It has been nearly three
 years since he went to Bonanza, and

NEW RESERVE IS CREATED

GOVERNMENT PROTECTS "MAR-
BLE HALLS OF JOSEPHINE"

GREATEST IN THE WORLD

Surpass in Beauty Anything Found
in the Mammoth Cave—Penalty
Placed on Vandalism.

District Forecaster E. T. Allen in
 Portland has just received a tele-
 gram stating that the President has
 signed a proclamation whereby one
 square mile of land surrounding the
 entrance to the famous Oregon caves
 or "Marble Halls of Josephine Coun-
 ty" is reserved from any form of dis-
 position and set aside as a national
 monument.

These wonderful caves are located
 within Siskiyou national forest,
 about thirty miles south of Grants
 Pass, Ore., in Cascade mountains, which
 is one of the peaks of the Brayback
 range. The main openings to the
 caves are at an elevation of about
 4,000 feet. The entire mountain side
 for five or six miles shows caverns of
 various sizes and it is believed that
 the interior is honeycombed with
 caverns like those which have al-
 ready been explored.

The caves were discovered in 1864
 by Elijah Davidson while bear hunt-
 ing. As far as known they have
 never been carefully explored. They
 appear to be made up of a series of
 galleries rather than roomy caverns,
 although many beautiful rooms have
 been discovered. There are thou-
 sands of passageways leading in all
 directions, many of which are partly
 closed by stalactites. Small streams
 are found at different elevations, and
 large bodies of running water can
 be heard in the pits, the bottoms of
 which have not yet been discovered.
 It is thought this running water ac-
 counts for the currents of wind
 which in some of the galleries blow
 so hard as to extinguish an open
 light.

The lime deposits take many beau-
 tiful forms; massive pillars, delicate
 stalactites of alabaster whiteness
 from the points of which suspend the
 crystal drop of water carrying its
 minute deposit of lime from which
 they are formed, and broad sheets
 resembling drapery with graceful
 curves and waves that seem to have
 been made by varying currents of
 wind.

Many beautiful and valuable spec-
 imens have been broken off and car-
 ried away by visitors during the past
 years, and it was this fact as well
 as to retain these natural wonders
 as public property that led to the
 establishment of the national monu-
 ment. The act under which the
 monument was established makes it
 an offense, punishable by fine or im-
 prisonment, or both, to appropriate,
 excavate, injure or destroy any ob-
 jects which possess historic or scien-
 tific interest.

For the present the monument will
 be under the control and supervision
 of Forest Supervisor M. J. Ander-
 son of Grants Pass, Ore.

Klamath Business.

Realizing the rich territory that
 lies at their door, the business men
 of Sacramento are preparing to give
 battle to San Francisco and Port-
 land for the trade of this section.
 The first step in this struggle will be
 taken to-day, when there will arrive
 in this city a delegation of the lead-
 ing business men of Sacramento.
 This excursion was planned to ar-
 rive here on Railroad day, but was
 reconsidered on account of the fact
 that it would be rather difficult for
 the business men here to give the
 same time and attention to the vis-
 itors during that period as they could
 if a later date was chosen. The
 Chamber of Commerce is making ar-
 rangements for the proper entertain-
 ment of the guests, and it is quite
 likely that they will realize that they
 made no mistake in coming to Klam-
 ath Falls.

The Portland and San Francisco
 wholesalers are waking up to the
 fact that Sacramento is a competitor
 worthy of their steel, and already
 there is talk of excursions from
 these cities. The relations existing

 and Sacramento are most cordial,
 and the indications are that this
 excursion will have the effect of ce-
 menting them more closely.
