BALLINGER IS ON THE WAY.

(Concluded From First Page.)

of the Northwestern projects, which will necessarily entail my remaining in this region for several weeks.

"So far as I know, there have been no complaints to me directly relative to the conduct of Indian agencies in this State. Whatever trouble has arisen has probably been referred to the Indian branch of the Interior Department without my attention being directed to it; hence I am unable to say what disposition will be made of conditions in that respect.

"It is impracticable to attempt to confine government irrigation solely to lands subject to appropriation for the reason that there are too many private holdings embraced therein. It is the opinion of the Attorney-General that the government cannot enter into partnership with settlers relative to reclamation funds, hence the present course of the Interior Department in that respect. If scrip can be handled so that it will not depreciate in value, I think the law should be amended so as to permit that system to be employed.

"I am not prepared to give an opinion concerning new reclamation projects, for the reason that I have not sufficiently investigated the subject. I think, however, that the lands ought not to be thrown open for entry until the water has been put on the various subdivisions. To do so would involve confusion, and sometimes absolute distress.

Need More Funds.

"We are badly handicapped with our funds in that respect, and ought to secure a larger appropriation from Congress, but as the situation is, we are compelled to be governed by our resources, and meet only those emergency cases in the Reclamation Service that confront the Interior Department imperatively. We need a lot of money in that department, but I shall not undertake to say just how much we may require, as I have not fully investigated the matter as yet. I intend to make a careful study of the whole situation, however, and perhaps when I get back to Washington I shall be able to arrive at a definite conclusion on the subject. I think, however, that it is the best policy to have all the funds available for irrigation projects before they are undertaken."

Judging from appearances, it is certainly the evident intention of Secretary Ballinger to make a careful study of every situation relative to his department, and be governed by conditions in some respects, although it is undoubtedly his intention to be as liberal as possible in the interpretation of the public land laws, with the idea of aiding settlers wherever possible. Asked how the West compared to the East in certain respects, Mr. Ballinger said:

"Oh, I'm a Westerner, and you know we wouldn't trade our country for all there is in the East. I don't mean any disrespect in that regard, but I guess that is the way everybody out here feels about it."—Telegram.
