### WELL LUMBER DIRECT

Many Oregon Mills Will Adopt Co-operative Plan.

Ten or more of the leading lumber companies of Portland and on the Columbia river are planning the organization of a co-operative selling company, such as that formed by the Central mills and still more recently by those of Grays and Willapa harbors, which sells the product of twenty-six mills, including the principal ones of Hoquiam, Aberdeen, Willapa, South Bend and Raymond.

It is understood that, with one exception, the principal companies of Portland and Oregon will enter the consolidation. Those which have been named are the Eastern and Western Lumber company, the Portland Lumber company, the St. John's Lumber company, the West Side Mill and Shingle company, the Multnomah Lumber company, the Peninsula Lumber company, the North Pacific Lumber company, Clarke & Wilson, East Side Mill and Lumber company and the Standard Box and Lumber company. It is understood that the Isman-Poulson company will not take part in the new company.

Mill owners and manufacturers of lumber have found in this way that the cost of advertising is lessened, the increase of sales made possible, and that small producers are thereby brought into direct touch with market and consumers, and are given an equal opportunity with the larger and more powerful mills. It further brings the profits directly into the pockets of the producer, eliminating the salesman or middleman.

That such a co-operative organization will be formed by the mills on the Columbia is very probable. The question has been in the minds of producing lumbermen for some time.

and it is thought by means of such a company the development of an extended demand for Oregon lumber would be made possible. Advertising would not be done by single companies, but by combined efforts.

Producing companies under the new system would not have individual representatives in the different marketing cities, but all business in eastern and southern markets would be done by representatives of the selling association, who would receive orders at a central office to be located in Portland.—Polk County Observer.

### THE FLY PEST

California State Board of Health Offers Suggestions.

The active campaign against flies made by the newspapers bodes good to the State. They are responsible for a vast amount of sickness, and their destruction will save many a trip of the "little white bears," and the big black one, too.

The campaign should be active from now on. No time to lose, for every day the flies multiply. No one can be excused from doing his part. It is not to the health officer we must principally look, but to the citizen. The health officer can advise and direct, and be active in spurring on the negligent and careless, and the city fathers should see that laws are passed obviating the accumulation of manure and other filth in which flies breed. The police authorities, who, as a rule, entirely neglect the enforcement of all sanitary regulations, should "get busy." They should arrest without fear or favor every one who does not obey all sanitary laws.

The citizen should take an interest, and for the sake of the health of his

family and the reputation of his town, clean up. The breeding place of flies is in the manure pile, the open toilet vault, in garbage, old rags, papers, vegetables, etc. The destruction of all these not only removes the breeding place of flies, but it counts for general sanitation and better standards of life.

This work should be done only by a united effort. The citizen must do the work and should do it willingly, but, if negligent, the strong hand of the law should compel.—Ashland Tidings.
