VISITING CARDS.
 Names and Messages Used to Be Scribbled on Playing Cards.
 It is somewhat curious that so useful an invention as the visiting card should have been unknown to society until comparatively recent times. Yet 150 years ago the carte de visite did not exist. The belles of the seventeenth century used nothing in the shape of a name card, or "ticket," as it was afterward called. Invitations to routs and drums as well as names and addresses were written across the backs of playing cards, which in those days were made with a white reverse and innocent of the intricate patterns familiar to us in modern times.
 Mary Wortley Montagu, a lady of ton, says the Connoisseur, would be apt to use a red playing card—a queen of hearts—for ordinary social purposes, while an amorous beau inscribed his name and the most tender of inquiries on the back of a jack of spades. The great world of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries was a small world. It was rigidly exclusive. Living in the same quarter of the town, the quality sent each other scribbled messages by the hand of a favorite page. Society, in a word, was informal in the midst of stately formalities, and we have no difficulty in believing the Comtesse de Boligne when she tells us that in 1800 Lady Harington used to trot up and down Bond street picking up guests for a party for the same night.

English Etchings.
 At Peckforton, Cheshire, England, is to be seen a very queer beehive. It is in the shape of a castle on an elephant's back and is carved in stone.
 Four miles from Bath, England, is a mysterious monument known as the "three shires stone." From it you can see parts of Somersetshire, Gloucestershire and Wiltshire.
 It is announced that with the removal of a row of frame buildings not far from Blackfriars bridge the last wooden buildings within the metropolitan district of London will shortly disappear.
 England has been witnessing a pronounced decline in charity fetes and balls, bazaars and fancy fairs, due, it is alleged, to the "gross and impudent dishonesty introduced into a large proportion of these charity festivals by the aristocratic ladies managing them."

Short Stories.
 More than 6,000 persons are burned to death in the United States each year, according to government figures.
 The proprietor of one of the principal stores in Meredith, N. H., has placed the business in the hands of his four clerks to be run by them during his vacation of a year.
 But seven states are represented in Congress entirely by natives of the states. These states are Delaware, Maine, Maryland, New Hampshire, South Carolina, Vermont and Virginia.
 The old Cole shop in Plymouth, erected in 1694, has been converted into a quick lunch room. It has been equipped with electric lights and a flashing electric sign. This was the first blacksmith shop erected in New England.

Facts From France.
 France has a number of good sized cities and towns still without electricity. One of them, La Rochelle, has a population of 30,000.
 An inhabitant of Farmoutiers, France, has left a legacy sufficient to provide prizes of 25 francs each yearly for the two most polite scholars, male and female, of the town. The winners are to be elected by ballot of their school-fellows.
 Frenchwomen have caused to be introduced in the chamber of deputies a bill abrogating the clause in the civil code declaring that the wife owes obedience to her husband. Some of the most distinguished women in the country are said to be behind the movement.

Tales of Cities.
 The city of Buenos Aires is one of the most beautiful in the world, a second Paris, in fact, with beautiful boulevards, avenues, statues, etc., in every direction.
 New York city has comparatively few old criminals. The average age of persons arrested for crimes during the last year was a little more than twenty-two years.
 Baltimore is congratulating herself on the figures shown by the new city directory, just issued. A decided growth commercially and a gain of nearly 12,000 in population in the last year are indicated. The population is placed at 601,128, which is a gain of 11,941, according to the directory editor's estimate.

Train and Track.
 The first sleeping car was started over the tracks in 1852.
 Trolley wheels four inches in diameter run from 8,000 to 10,000 miles, while six inch wheels run between 20,000 and 25,000 miles.
 More than \$20,000,000 has been paid to employees of the Pennsylvania railroad system out of the relief fund that was established by the company in 1890.
 The longest stretch of straight track in the United States is on the Lake Shore railroad beginning at a point three miles west of Toledo, O., and running sixty-nine miles without a curve.

FLOATING PALACES.
 Sailors of the Hindoo Rajahs on the Ganges River.
 Notwithstanding the fact that India has for many years been under the rule of England, the conditions and manner of living have not greatly changed in many parts of it. On the Ganges river in the northwest provinces the tourist will see, if he approaches Benares at the right time, the same type of craft that carried pilgrims to this most sacred of Hindoo cities hundreds of years ago. These are floating palaces or magnificent galleys on which rajahs journey to Benares and which serve as a test of their piety zeal.
 These galleys differ hardly at all from the vessels used for the same purpose by rajahs who died centuries past. Incrusted with gold, silver and pearl, and decorated with tapestries embroidered with precious metals and jewels, these wonderful modern-ancient vessels lend a festive touch to the river scene. But their sumptuousness does not prevent the richest rajah who possesses one from bathing in the same water, surrounded by 500,000 poorer pilgrims, even though the sacred river is thus plausibly filled with myriads of microbes. And he will fill great jars with the water in which the pilgrims have washed their bodies and drink it.
 In contrast to these floating palaces are the barges of the poorer classes. The system of caste in India imposes upon the riverman the obligation of living on the water as his ancestors lived, so his shabby looking craft is also his home. Usually he has in his floating house a small chapel dedicated to a secondary divinity who personifies the river on which he exists.—Popular Mechanics.
