Princess Albert of Belgium is said to be the happiest wife in the courts of Europe.

The Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary is the eldest son of the Archduke Charles Louis by his wife, the Infanta Maria Theresa of Portugal. He was born in 1893 and is the nephew and heir of the Emperor Franz Joseph.

Law Points.

A covenant in a deed that the grantor has a good and perfect title, if untrue, is held in Webb versus Wheeler (Neb.), 114 N. W. 380; 17 L. R. A. (N. S.), 1178, to be broken when made and a right of action to accrue thereon at once.

Where land is conveyed to a trustee for the maintenance of a family it is held in Talley versus Ferguson (W. Va.), 93 S. E. 450; 17 L. R. A. (N. S.), 1212, that none of the beneficiaries has any distinct or separable interest therein during the existence of the trust which he can charge or alien.
