 Patch" I will give what information
 I can.

The berries are very scarce and
 green as yet, very few beginning to
 ripen. It will not pay people to pack
 in here for two or three weeks yet,
 perhaps not then.

Deer seem plentiful. J. A. Mar-
 tin killed a handsome buck last
 night and Mr. Lewis a small one.

People are coming to the foot of
 the mountain and going back with-
 out coming up. There are very few
 berries at Lake of the Woods. The
 frost seems to have killed most of
 them.

On August 5th a party consisting
 of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Kirkendall,
 Harry Wilson and Mr. Summers
 climbed to the top of Mt. Pitt. A for-
 est fire in the region of Pilot Rock
 obscured the view of the valley, but
 all felt amply repaid for their climb.
