lands by the government, distinctly provides that such sale must be upon the basis of the minimum price of \$2.50 an acre.
It is also claimed by the opponents of the commissioner's ruling that his action has operated to cause many purchasers to seek entry of these tracts with lien script, the price of which has been fixed by the Northern Pacific Railroad company, which enjoys a monopoly of the commodity, at a price so much lower than the government rate under present conditions that it is not only a cheaper method of acquiring title, but also obviates the necessity of encountering the tedious and vexatious delays incident to the public land laws. It is held by those who declare they have made a careful analysis of the situation that at the appraisal valuation of timber lands as fixed by the land department, the price thereof is liable to run from \$10 to \$50 an acre, putting them beyond the reach of the ordinary locator, and having a tendency to suppress almost entirely the further sale of timber lands by the government through the various district land offices.
New Ruling Doesn't Work.
A number of those interested in the entry of timber lands have formed a pool for the purpose of giving the question a complete test in the United States courts. Former United States Attorney W. C. Bristol and John F. Logan will represent them in the proceedings, the fees of the two lawyers to be paid by a general subscription from those involved. It is claimed that wherever the attention of entrymen under the old law has been called to the situation they have responded liberally in the matter of donations to the general fund for this purpose, hence it is reasonable to suppose that the court proceedings will soon be inaugurated. While here on his recent tour of inspection of the field service of the public land states, Commissioner Dennett admitted frankly that the new regulation was not working to his complete satisfaction, and expressed the hope that the proposed test of the right to make such an order would be pressed to a speedy conclusion.
