RAILROAD CONSTRUCTORS' SIDE
OF THE STORY

Erickson & Peterson Say Their Time
Checks Can Be Converted Into
Bank Checks Without Loss.

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 25.
Editor Evening Herald: In your is-
sue of August 24th you have seen fit
to publish an article headed "Hold Up
His Pay. Erickson & Peterson Refuse
to Issue Cain's Time Check," etc. The
article is absolutely libelous. In the
first place, Cain was not "at his post"
the morning of the fire. He was
asleep in a tent distant from the
shovel almost as far as from the
kitchen which was burned—probably
fifty yards, and he has so admitted
to Mr. Peterson. When he asked for
his time check (which was for the
amount of \$36.95 instead of \$53, as
your paper stated) it was promptly
given him by the undersigned, no de-
duction being made on account of his
carelessness except for the night on
which the fire occurred, and on which
he admitted he was asleep. Cain
made but one demand for his time
check, and was never refused.

When I handed him the time check
asked for, Cain asked if the check
was negotiable paper. He was in-
formed that it was if presented at the
office at Dorris, which is the head of-
fice of the company for the California
and Northeastern contract. He
said he had no business at Dorris and
asked if he could get it cashed at the
bank in town. I told him "yes."
"But I will be discounted," said he.
"I suppose you will," said I, "but if
you do not want to go to Dorris you
can mail your time checks and a bank
check will be sent you by return mail,
and there will be no discount what-
ever." "I guess I don't want these,"
said he, and he handed back the time
checks.

Cain was shipped to this work as a
laborer and was to receive \$1.75 per
day. He was given free transporta-
tion from Central California to this
place, the consideration being that he
enter the employ of Erickson & Pet-
tersen. Like many other employees,
he no doubt wished to evade his con-
tract and secure other employment.
He did not evince much desire to take
common labor and was given a free-
no team, wages \$2 per day with a
bonus of 25c per day if he worked 30
days. His time check called for
22 2-10 days at \$2.25 per day. During
the time he was watchman he was
paid at the rate of \$1.75.

Erickson & Peterson pay every
man the full amount they agree to
pay, and although it is their rule to
pay but once a month, this rule is in-
variably suspended whenever an em-
ployee quits or is discharged. He can
always get a bank check for his time
by going to or sending to Dorris. If
he gives the timekeeper the requisite
authority the bank check will be sent
for and Erickson & Peterson bank
checks are cashed everywhere with-
out discount.

same publicity you gave the article
